Progress the jurisdiction has made in carrying out its strategic plan and its action plan. 91.520(a)

This could be an overview that includes major initiatives and highlights that were proposed and executed throughout the program year.

The 2023-2024 Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) for the County of Riverside reflects the County's performance and accomplishments relative to achieving its goals and objectives in the fifth and final year of its 2019-2024 Five-Year Consolidated Plan (CP). The CAPER describes and evaluates how Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME), HOME ARP, and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds received from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) were utilized and expended to meet the CP five-year strategic goals for the reporting period July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024.

Below is a summary of expenditures and accomplishments for the County in Program Year 2023-2024:

CDBG Accomplishments:

- A total of sixty (60) public facilities/improvement projects were underway in the program year 2023-24; of those, fourteen (14) were completed, and forty-six (46) are still underway. These projects included ADA accessibility improvements, streets, curbs, gutters, sidewalks, water/sewer improvements, parks/recreational facilities, senior centers, AIDS patient facilities, parking facilities, and neighborhood and handicapped center improvements. A total of \$6,334,929.29 was expended for these projects.
- Two (2) Code Enforcement projects were underway in 2023-24, expending \$203,250.10.
- A total of fifty-one (51) public service projects were undertaken, and fifty-one (51) were completed in the program year 2023-24. No activities will carry over public service projects and will be included in the 2024-25 public service expenditure calculation. Public services included senior services, food assistance programs, health services, handicapped services, homeless shelters and programs, subsistence payments, security deposits, services for abused and neglected children, neighborhood cleanups, and childcare and youth services. A total of \$919,181.45 was expended.
- Eleven (11) Economic Development projects were underway, and ten (10) were completed, expending \$70,000.
- A total of sixty-seven (67) housing rehabilitation projects were undertaken to improve substandard housing conditions for low-income homeowners, seniors, and disabled persons. Twenty-nine (29) projects were completed expending \$2,327,745.48.
- Seven (7) program administration projects were completed, \$1,514,869.69 was expended for overall program management of

the CDBG program, Fair Housing administrative costs, and Metro-City administration costs.

HOME Accomplishments:

The County of Riverside administers the HOME Program throughout the county's unincorporated areas and within participating cities. A total of \$2,253,286.38 in HOME funding was utilized to:

- \$30,709.42 Address Farmworker Housing needs; Coachella Valley I \$30,709.42 (2019 EN)
- \$343,304.49 Program Administration; \$168,285.45 (2022 AD), and \$5,415.40 (2022 PA) and \$91,758.48 (2023 AD) and \$77,845.16 (2023 PA).
- \$50,000.00 Community Development Housing Organizations (CHDO); Villa Hermosa III \$50,000.00 (2020 EN).
- \$1,829,272.47- Expand the affordable rental housing stock for farm workers; Monarch Apartments \$480,887.56 (2021 PI) and \$149,112.44 (2022 PI); Monamos Terrace Apartment \$33,286.98 (2020 EN); Covalda Apartments (fka Tripoli Apartments) \$434,311.95 (2021 EN), \$31,673.54 (2022 EN), \$418,650.41 (2020 PI) and \$281,349.59 (2021 PI).

ESG Accomplishments:

The County allocated 2023-2024 ESG funding to four (4) subrecipients providing emergency shelter, outreach services, homelessness prevention, and rapid re-housing programs and services for persons either at risk of or experiencing homelessness. A total of \$618,683 was expended.

- \$245,000 Provided Emergency Shelter funding to assist with essential services, operation and maintenance, and HMIS staff cost for the operations of the shelters to serve 2,714 individuals
- \$202,772 Provided Rapid Re-housing to house a total of twelve (12) individuals served
- \$50,000 Provided Homelessness Prevention to house eight (8) households for a total of twelve (12) individuals served
- \$74,510 Provided Street Outreach Services to 255 homeless individuals living on the streets and areas not habitable for individuals

CDBG-CV Funding Summary

On March 27, 2020, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES), Public Law 116-136, was signed by the President of the United States. This made available \$5 billion in Community Development Block Grant Coronavirus (CDBG-CV) funds to respond to the growing effects of the historic COVID-19 public health crisis. The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) informed the County of Riverside that CARES Act funding would be allocated to the County based on the existing entitlement formulas for the CDBG program.

Pursuant to the CARES Act, the County has been allocated \$10,405,129 of CDBG-CV funding. These funds have subsequently been allocated to a micro-enterprise loan program, a rental assistance program, and program administration.

CDBG-CV funding was allocated to jurisdictions in three phases. HUD allocated the first and third phases of CDBG-CV funds to the County in the amount of \$4,741,211 and \$5,663,918, respectively. The County did not receive funding in the second phase of funding. During the 2020 program year, the County allocated the phases of funding to Subsistence Payments. Each project was selected to assist in carrying out the County's CDBG priority need of COVID-19 Preparation, Prevention, and Response, as identified in the amended 2019-2024 Consolidated Plan's Strategic Plan.

CDBG-CV Accomplishments:

- Two (2) public service projects were undertaken and completed for Subsistence Payment through CDBG-CV. A total of 5\$9,909,042 was expended.
- A total of \$496,087 was expended for administration and program management of the CDBG-CV program.

ESG-CV Funding Summary

The County was also allocated \$8,565,690 of ESG-CV funding. ESG-CV1 funds were allocated to eleven (11) activities. On August 22, 2022, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) awarded the County of Riverside an estimated amount of \$665,911.16 of reallocated funds from the ESG-CV appropriation, bringing the allocation to \$9,231,601.16.

ESG-CV Accomplishments:

- \$3,734,900.74 Provided Emergency Shelter funding to assist with essential services, operation and maintenance, and HMIS staff cost for the operations of shelters
- \$317,818.28 Provided Rapid Re-housing
- \$3,556,130.99 Provided Homelessness Prevention
- \$1,132,557.47 Provided Street Outreach Services to homeless individuals living on the streets and areas not habitable for individuals
- A total of \$490,193.68 was expended for administration and program management of the ESG-CV program.

HOME-ARP Funding Summary

On March 11, 2021, President Biden took a significant step by signing the American Rescue Plan (ARP) into law, allocating over \$1.9 trillion to address the long-lasting effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on various sectors. Notably, on September 20, 2021, HUD made strides by allocating HOME-ARP grants to participating jurisdictions (PJ) to effectively provide assistance and supportive services for homeless individuals. This allocation allowed PJs to kickstart their planning for the utilization of HOME-ARP funds, giving them access to 5 percent of their HOME-ARP grant for eligible program administration and planning activities related to their HOME-ARP Allocation Plan. The ARP funds, to be administered through HOME, are dedicated to four crucial activities intended to primarily benefit homeless individuals, those at risk of homelessness, and vulnerable populations.

HOME-ARP Accomplishments:

- \$2,000,000 for the Cathedral Palms Senior Apartments, restricted to sixty-eight (68) units, aims to provide housing and wraparound services for HOME ARP qualifying senior populations facing homelessness and other challenges.
- \$246,211 is earmarked for administration in the County to kickstart the planning and preparation of the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan, and other vital program planning activities.

The CAPER provides a detailed description of how the County provided new or improved availability/accessibility, affordability, or sustainability for the following goals for which funding was allocated:

- •Provide decent and affordable housing for low- and moderate-income households and those with special needs;
- •Provide safer, more livable neighborhoods; and
- •Expand economic opportunities

The Accomplishments Table above provides a summary of these priority goals and the County's success in meeting the established objectives set forth in the Five Year 2019-2024 CP and Annual Action Plan. Unfortunately, as with most priority goals, the needs far outweigh the County's available resources, which are insufficient to address all of the needs of low- and moderate-income persons or special needs residents in the County's CPD program area.

During the 2023-2024 program year, CDBG funding focused primarily on the highest plan priorities to address specific objectives, including the revitalization of neighborhoods, construction and/or rehabilitation of public facilities, provision of public services, ADA accessibility improvements, housing rehabilitation, and activities furthering fair housing.

HOME funds were used to address housing priorities throughout the County of Riverside established in the fifth year 2023-2024 of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan with projected goals. Accomplishments are shown in the tables above. The County's one-year goal was to assist 20 first-time homebuyer households, but due to the state of the housing market, low-income first-time homebuyers have had a difficult time qualifying for a mortgage and finding homes. Once supply meets demand and interest comes back down, we anticipate more households will take advantage of the County's down payment assistance program.

The County has the following five affordable housing developments in the pipeline that are under construction and nearing completion that will be reported in the next reporting period:

- The Monarch Apartment Homes, 60-multifamily unit to expand the affordable rental housing in the City of Palm Springs;
- Monamos Terrace Apartments, 139 multifamily units to Expand the affordable rental housing stock in the City of Murrieta;
- Placita Dolores Huerta (formerly known as Coachella Valley I Apartments), a 56-unit to address the farmworker housing needs in the City of Coachella; and
- Covalda Apartments (formerly Tripoli Apartments), 108 multifamily units to expand affordable rental housing in the City of Coachella.
- Cathedral Palms Apartments, 231 units to expand affordable rental housing in the City of Cathedral City.

ESG activities were mainly directed at increasing services to at-risk populations and, where possible, reducing affordable housing costs by providing overnight shelter, outreach, homelessness prevention, and rapid re-housing services for persons at risk of or experiencing homelessness.

The overall low-mod benefit for the 2023-2024 CDBG program year was 100.00%, exceeding the minimum 70% low-mod HUD benefit requirement. Measurable progress was made on many of the Five-Year CP goals. In many circumstances, actual accomplishments exceeded those proposed. Public facility/ infrastructure projects that have been experiencing delays are mostly due to the need to secure additional funding, an increase in the cost of materials and/or labor, unforeseen weather conditions, and, in some instances, a lack of dedicated staff resources. These projects are currently underway and will report accomplishments in upcoming CAPERs.

Narrative

The CDBG Table above has been adjusted to reflect more accurate data by including the additional

race/ethnicity categories collected and reported for total persons/households assisted. For the ESG Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) data, please refer to Appendix C - SAGE Report. The HOME figures above have been adjusted to reflect more accurate data through the revised PR23 report and the attached spreadsheet indicating the Race and ethnicity of families assisted in FY 23/24.

According to the United States Census Bureau, in 2022, 30.2% of county residents were White, 52% Hispanic, 6.1% Black/African American, 7.0% Asian, and 4.6% other races. From 2013 to 2022, the proportion of Hispanic residents in the County increased by nearly 5.1%, while the proportion of White residents declined by 7.7% over the same period. The cities of Banning, Beaumont, Blythe, Calimesa, Coachella, Corona, Desert Hot Springs, Eastvale, Hemet Indio, Jurupa Valley, La Quinta, Lake Elsinore, Menifee, Moreno Valley, Murrieta, Norco, Palm Desert, Palm Springs, Perris, Riverside, San Jacinto, Temecula, and Wildomar had significant Hispanic concentrations. The cities of Banning, Beaumont, Blythe, Desert Hot Springs, Eastvale, Hemet, Lake Elsinore, Menifee, Moreno Valley, Perris, and San Jacinto, Black/African American populations are greater than the county-wide proportion.

The recipients in the above/below tables represent the county's diversity that was assisted with HUD-funded programs during the 2023-2024 program year. The City of Riverside reports HOPWA program outcomes.

The County is committed to allocating CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds to address community development needs of the lowest-income and most disadvantaged residents based upon the individual eligibility requirements of the specific CPD program. Assistance was targeted to populations residing in areas of low-income and minority concentrations. However, while projects and programs will target low-income and minority populations, they will not necessarily be limited geographically to areas where these populations are concentrated. Some service providers are not located in low/moderate-income census tracts; however, their services are designed and intended for low/moderated-income clients. These may include clinics, food pantries, senior centers, health care facilities, etc.

Narrative

The table above illustrates the amount of funding for CDBG, HOME, and ESG for the 2023-2024 program year; it does not account for all unspent prior-year funds. The County estimated \$10,824,460 in CDBG resources, \$3,316,634 in HOME resources, and \$618,683 in ESG resources to allocate to projects to carry out the goals outlined in the County's CP and OYAP.

Program Income (PI) is generated from repayments or other funding accrued and collected from previously funded CDBG and HOME projects and is allocated based on HUD's unrestricted program income requirements. During the 2023-2024 program year, the County received \$71,688.38 CDBG PI. To ensure timely expenditure of the 2023-2024 CDBG PI, the County allocated/expended the funding to five (5) new and/or existing CDBG projects throughout the program year. The County's HOME program received \$584,670.27 in HOME PI/HP, and the County allocated/expended the funding to new construction projects throughout the program year.

The County is committed to allocating funds to projects and activities that serve the needs of the lowest-income and most disadvantaged residents to improve their quality of life either directly or indirectly. In Riverside County, as with many other jurisdictions, the need for housing and community development funds far outweighs the available resources. Although needs are high in all of the top priority areas, with limited funds and resources available, there is a high possibility that some of the needs will not be addressed.

Per IDIS Report PR26 (Appendix A) – CDBG Financial Summary Report (2023-2024 program year) are as follows:

Low/Mod Benefit for program year: 100.00% Planning and Administration (Cap 20%): 19.13%

Public Service (Cap 15%): 12.05%

The CDBG Expenditure Report, IDIS Report PR03, shows that the County's CDBG program disbursed \$11,166,725.91 in the program year 2023-2024. The HOME Drawdown IDIS PR07 report indicates that \$2,253,286.38 in HOME funds was disbursed in the program year 2023-2024. The ESG Financial Summary Reports IDIS Report (PR91) confirms that \$618,683 was disbursed in the program year 2023-2024.

Two CPD-funded programs, HOME and ESG, have matching fund requirements – HOME 25% and ESG 100%. These regulatory matching requirements ensure the efficient use of Federal funds through leveraging. The CDBG regulations do not require a funding match for the program; however, the County strongly encourages leveraging CDBG funds and gives priority consideration in evaluating proposed activities that leverage other funding. CDBG funds are matched in the participating cities with other funds available to cities, such as general funds and other local resources. It is anticipated that federal and private funding sources for housing and community development programs will remain limited, even under these circumstances; the county strives to make progress in implementing its public improvement and community service projects and programs and meeting the established objectives. As in the past, the county and cooperating cities will be as creative as possible in finding other additional sources of funding in order to develop and deliver efficient and cost-effective projects. CDBG, HOME, and ESG-funded activities will be leveraged, whenever possible, by other federal and/or governmental support for their specific type of services.

Narrative

Riverside County is the fourth most populous county in the state. It is also a very large county geographically. Due to the vast distance between communities and cities, the Delivery System can become complicated by the geographical challenges, which contribute to impediments encountered by private, non-profit, and government agencies attempting to provide services to low-income residents. The County seeks to direct CDBG, HOME, and ESG grant funds primarily to the five (5) Supervisorial Districts, thirteen (13) Cooperating Cities, two (2) Metropolitan City/Urban County participants with a population over 50,000, and approximately sixty-three (63) unincorporated communities and neighborhoods. Funding decisions for the County program are based on the needs and strategies discussed in the County's Consolidated Plan. Funded activities target geographic areas with the greatest socio-economic distress. These programs aim to maintain and improve neighborhoods and communities within the unincorporated County. To this end, various public services, public works projects, housing production, rehabilitation programs, and economic development activities are undertaken. Public funds are leveraged with private resources to maximize the effects of formula grant investment.

The County has not established specific priority or target areas *per se* to focus the investment of funds; therefore, for purposes of the 2023-2024 OYAP and 2019-2024 Five-Year CP, geographic areas are more loosely defined to include administration, countywide, supervisorial districts, cooperating cities, and metro city(s). Priorities differ for each of the three formula grants. CDBG funds (refer to the above table) were distributed using a "fair-share" formula, which is based on a formula that accounts for population levels, overcrowding, and poverty. Households with incomes below 80 percent of the Area Median Income (AMI) and particularly those with extremely low incomes (less than 30 percent of the area median income) are particular priorities. Priority is given to CDBG projects that benefit the greatest percentage of low/moderate-income persons, both as Low/Mod Area (LMA) or Low/Mod Clientele (LMC). Some service providers in the County may not always be located in low/moderate-income census tracts, yet their services are designed and intended for low/moderate-income clients. These may include clinics, food pantries, senior centers, health care facilities, etc. Approximately 80% of the County's CDBG allocation, excluding

funding for administration, was divided among the thirteen (13) participating cities, two (2) Metro City, and sixty-three (63) County unincorporated areas.

HOME funds were not allocated geographically; they were made available county-wide through an over-the-counter application process, with 100% targeting the county's unincorporated areas and cooperating cities, with no priority area given the distinction.

ESG funds are awarded county-wide through a competitive process following federal guidelines. The County consults with the CoC to provide ESG funding recommendations to work in collaboration in targeting efforts to those who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless to eliminate and prevent homelessness. In 2023-24, consultation was extended to include a recommended allocation of funding and feedback requests and meetings with CoC staff and representatives to review the needs and gaps in assistance throughout Riverside County. ESG funding continues to be allocated to help address a wide range of opportunities to align with the Continuum of Care (CoC) Program designed to promote communitywide commitment to ending homelessness. Future goals include conducting meetings to determine the needs of the homeless, mapping areas of the homeless from the PIT count, gathering gap analysis data, and reporting GIS locations of services.

Leveraging

Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.

The County leverages its CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds with other resources to increase the impact on housing, community development, and homelessness issues. Given the extent and level of housing and other community and economic development needs in Riverside County, it is essential that the limited resources made available through the CPD programs be leveraged with other resources. Many of the most successful affordable housing projects, community facilities, and public service programs were leveraged with other funds.

The CDBG regulations do not require a funding match for the program; however, the County strongly encourages leveraging CDBG funds and gives priority consideration in evaluating proposed activities that leverage CDBG with other funding. Applicants requesting funds to support its programs and projects are asked to provide documentation of other funding sources they will use as leverage to meet their needs. Examples of leveraging can be land, other Federal, State, or local government assistance, in-kind services, donations, private resources, or other subsidized financing. CDBG funds are matched with city general funds and other local resources in the participating cities.

Two CPD-funded programs, HOME and ESG, have matching fund requirements. Both regulatory matching requirements ensure the efficient use of Federal funds through leveraging. The Emergency Solutions Grant program has a mandatory dollar-for-dollar match requirement for subrecipients. The county's ESG grant funds were matched more than seven times with its ESG allocation with federal, state, local, and other private resources.

The leveraging of public and private funds is critical to the success of HOME projects. In order to provide sufficient financial support, most HOME projects require layered funding. HOME Program regulations require a twenty-five percent (25%) non-Federal match for every HOME dollar expended. The HOME program requires that PJ's provide match in an amount equal to no less than 25% of the total HOME funds drawn down for project costs. Former Redevelopment Agency Housing funds, sweat equity, State Permanent Local Housing Allocation funds, and State of California Housing Program Funds were the primary funding sources to provide match for the HOME program. The 25% minimum HOME matching requirement was \$847,641.95. According to the Integrated Disbursement and Information System (IDIS) for FY 2023-2024, the County met and exceeded its match obligation with a total of \$98,987,585.35 in excess matching funds carried over from the previous fiscal year.

Funds set aside for program administration and for Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) technical assistance/capacity building is exempt from this matching

requirement. The match must be met by the end of the Federal FY in which the expenditure occurred. This requirement is not project-specific but rather program-wide.

HOME funds were leveraged through the use of gap financing. Prior to HOME funds being awarded, developers must identify and secure all other funding necessary for the development of proposed housing projects. Active HOME-funded projects during this reporting period leveraged HOME funds with the following: low-income housing tax credits, State Permanent Local Housing funds, Federal Home Loan Bank Affordable Housing Program (AHP) funds, Affordable Housing Sustainable Communities (AHSC), No Place Like Home (NPLH), Veterans Housing and Homelessness Prevention Program (VHHPP), U.S. Department of Agriculture 514 Loan, and Housing Choice Voucher Program (HCVP or Section 8) Project Based Vouchers. The following HOME-funded projects that have Section 8 project-based vouchers as a leveraging source that are under construction or scheduled to start construction by next reporting period are the following: Placita Dolores Huerta in the City of Coachella, Monarch Apartments in the City of Palm Springs, Monamos Apartments in the City of Murrieta, Covalda Apartment in the City of Coachella, and Cathedral Palms Apartment in the City of Cathedral City.

Evaluation of the jurisdiction's progress in providing affordable housing, including the number and types of families served, the number of extremely low-income, low-income, moderate-income, and middle-income persons served.

The County of Riverside is committed to making affordable housing to all its residents. The County of Riverside manages a portfolio of 47 affordable housing projects funded with HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) funds that primarily serve households earning less than 60% of the Area Median Income. In its current portfolio, the County possesses over 7,915 affordable housing units funded with various sources, 3,986 units were funded directly by the County using one or more of the following sources: HOME, NSP, CDBG, Mortgage Revenue Bonds, and former Redevelopment Funds (RDA). The number of projects/units may fluctuate annually because projects are removed from the portfolio at fulfillment of their affordability period. However, due to the County's commitment to affordable housing, at least two projects are added annually to offset project/unit attrition.

The table below compares the County's annual goals for FY 2023-2024 with the actual number of completed HOME units brought online from July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024.

Affordable housing developments and renovations are typically multi-year projects and are subject to the ability to secure funding from various funding sources. Often, the ability to meet the anticipated goals is dictated by various factors that can create disparities between goals and actual outcomes such as: funding availability, timing, and project schedules. Often, unexpected challenges are encountered during the construction phase of the project which causes delays that impact project/unit delivery.

In FY 2023-2024, there were several HOME-funded multifamily developments at various stages of development and construction including the following projects:

- The Monarch Apartment Homes, City of Palm Springs: 60 units, anticipated to be reported in FY 2024-2025
- Monamos Terrace Apartments, City of Murrieta: 140 units, anticipated to be reported in FY 2024-2025
- Covalda Apartments (formerly Tripoli Apartments), City of Coachella: 108 units, anticipated to be reported in FY 2024-2025
- Placita Dolores Huerta (formerly known as Coachella Valley I Apartments), 56 units, anticipated to be reported in FY 2024-2025
- Cathedral Palms Apartments, 231 units, anticipated to be reported in FY 2024-2025

Narrative Information

The County's One-Year Goal proposed the production 40 new units of HOME-assisted housing. In FY 2023-2024, the County contributed to the production of a total of 100 rental units (11 HOME units) to exceed that goal with more in the pipeline. Completed projects are as follows:

• Villa Hermosa III, City of Indio: 100 units (11 HOME units)

The County of Riverside Department of Housing and Workforce Solutions (HWS) provides exterior repair of stick-built and modular (attached to private land) owner-occupied, single-family residences. Grants are awarded for the cost of repairs to renovate eligible homes to address a property's health, safety, and housing quality standard deficiencies as defined by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. A total of twenty-seven (27) low-moderate income households benefited from this program. A total of \$1,239,668 in CDBG funds were expended in 2023-24.

CR-25 - Homeless and Other Special Needs 91.220(d, e); 91.320(d, e); 91.520(c)

Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The Riverside County Continuum of Care (CoC) conducts outreach to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons and chronic homeless) and assesses their individual needs in partnership with the County of Riverside Department of Housing and Workforce Solutions (HWS), the Collaborative Applicant for the CoC, and housing and service partners that make up the CoC membership. The CoC Structure engages more than 100 member agencies representing diverse sectors of government, medical and health, business, law enforcement, housing, and homeless providers, education, and others.

The Riverside County 2023 Homeless Point-In-Time Count (HPITC) conducted between the dates of January 25 and January 27, 2023, identified a total of 3,725 homeless individuals experiencing homelessness (12% increase from 2022); of that 2,441 were unsheltered representing 66% of the total count (23% increase) and 1,284 sheltered representing 34% of the total count (4% decrease).

Data collected during the Count reflects a snapshot of Riverside County's homeless population at one particular point in time. Among the 3,725 persons experiencing homelessness counted, 229 were Transitional Age Youth (18-24) (27% decrease from 2022), 257 were seniors aged 62 or above (6% increase), 256 were veterans (31% increase) and 143 were households with children (12% increase). People who are first time homeless and chronically homeless increased 19% and 18% respectively from 2022. Those with substance use and mental health issues increased by 17% and 8% respectively from 2022. Among the 2,441 unsheltered persons experiencing homelessness, 502 were first time homeless (19% increase), 659 were chronically homeless (18% increase), 458 were engaged in substance use (17% increase) and 325 have mental health issues (8% increase). population, one category that demonstrated an increase is the chronically homeless from 206 in 2021 to 256 in 2022. Among the unsheltered homeless population, the highest subpopulation groups were persons that reported using drugs (14%), having a mental health condition (14%), and being Chronically Homeless (25%) Recovery Services and the Riverside University Health System Behavioral Health continue to work collaboratively with the CoC to increase the number of permanent supportive housing beds that are available for persons suffering with mental health and substance abuse problems.

The Riverside County CoC moved to a bi-annual unsheltered count beginning in 2023 with the next count scheduled for January 2025. The 2024 Housing Inventory Count (HIC) for the sheltered count conducted on January 24th, 2024, revealed that 1,808 persons experiencing homelessness were sheltered through Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing programs compared to 1,284 in 2023 representing a 41% increase. This increase in sheltered count numbers is primarily due to expanded efforts in capturing all available beds across the county. A primary factor in this growth is the inclusion of sheltering data from the Department of Public Social Services (DPSS) CalWORKs program, which provided data for the first time this year. Additionally, expansions in new and existing sheltering projects, driven by local investments to increase housing across our region, also contributed to the increase.

The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) CoC Program funding continues to prioritize the objective of creating new permanent housing beds for homeless individuals and families throughout the county. On February 1, 2024, HUD announced the FY 2023 CoC Program Competition awards. The Riverside County CoC was awarded \$15.7 million to fund a total of 20 projects providing leasing, rental assistance, and essential supportive services with a total of 833 beds in 576 units in rapid re-housing and permanent supportive housing. This amount represents an increase of 10% or \$1.5 million from HUD 2022 awards.

The Riverside County CoC has made an impact on helping to eliminate homelessness. Specifically, the CoC implemented programs that have shown promise in placing people who are chronically homeless into permanent housing first, following up with services that address barriers that keep people homeless. The CoC strengthens coordination among the network of providers and focuses resources on helping individuals and families who are homeless to become "rapidly re-housed" through temporary, one-time assistance. The Riverside County CoC will continue to apply for new funding to bring more services and resources dedicated to make homelessness among youth rare, brief, and non-recurring. It is currently anticipating an announcement from HUD in late fall of 2023 in response to the Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program (YHDP) application submitted on June 26, 2023, requesting for \$2 million in funding.

The Riverside County CoC has implemented and developed a Coordinated Entry System (CES) to link homeless families and individuals with the appropriate assistance they need to end homelessness. A CES Advisory Team, with the assistance of outreach workers, housing navigators, housing case managers, and others, formed to develop written standards, policies, and guidelines for the CES. The Advisory Team is made up of representatives from providers of permanent supportive housing, rapid re-housing, emergency shelter, and transitional housing (TH). The CES covers a large geographic area, is easily accessed by individuals and families seeking housing or

services, is well advertised, and includes a comprehensive and standardized assessment tool. The Riverside University Health System – Behavioral Health (RUHS-BH), formerly the County of Riverside Department of Mental Health, is the lead agency responsible for implementing the County's CES. The Riverside County CoC plans to capitalize on the CES to strengthen service coordination and delivery for its target population including single adults, families, youth, and veterans experiencing homelessness.

The Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) is administered by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) and serves to provide flexible block grant funds to support regional coordination and expand or develop local capacity to address immediate homelessness challenges. The Riverside County CoC has received an award through all five (5) Rounds of HHAP, for a total of \$\$18,849,811.83 in funding to be used for Rental Assistance and Rapid Re-housing, Operating Subsidies, Outreach and Coordination, Systems support, and Delivery of permanent housing and innovative housing solutions. The Riverside County CoC received \$3,311,372.74 from HHAP Round 1; \$1,566,822 from HHAP Round 2; \$4,207,199.87 from HHAP Round 3; \$4,407,903.41 from HHAP Round 4, and \$5,356,513.81 from HHAP Round 5.

The County of Riverside Department of Housing and Workforce Solutions (HWS) is responsible for the administration of a centralized and coordinated Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), for the County of Riverside CoC and the HMIS Lead Organization. HWS has the responsibility to establish, support, and manage HMIS in a manner that will meet HUD's standards for quality, privacy, security, and other requirements for organizations participating in HMIS. The HMIS is a mandatory comprehensive and standardized assessment tool used to collect client-level data and data on the provision of housing and services to homeless individuals and families and persons at risk of homelessness. The County of Riverside has been significantly investing in enhancing our HMIS by updating functionality to include Geographic Information System (GIS) tracking to record participant service locations more accurately and purchasing additional licenses to meet increasing needs. This strategic investment has resulted in the implementation of an improved and more inclusive system. This upgraded system effectively supports a wider range of functions, including accommodating larger street outreach, navigation, and case management teams. Furthermore, it has led to enhanced reporting efficiency. Another aspect of our investment has been in providing comprehensive HMIS user training. This web-based training initiative has proven to be beneficial on multiple fronts. It has notably increased the efficiency of HMIS users, resulting in higher data quality. Moreover, this training approach has contributed to a reduction in troubleshooting support tickets and has streamlined the process of data entry. These

investments collectively reinforce our commitment to optimizing the HMIS to better serve our community's needs and streamline our operations. The County, along with its subrecipients, collaborates closely with the CoC to ensure that the screening, assessment, and referral processes for program participants align with established standards. This collaborative effort is aimed at maintaining consistency in these processes across the board and reduce the turnaround time for clients to receive services.

Furthermore, the County remains committed to ongoing coordination and collaboration with the CoC and other essential stakeholders. This commitment extends to fostering a comprehensive and community-wide coordinated assessment process. This approach ensures that our HMIS operates seamlessly to facilitate coordination of services and funding streams, ultimately benefiting the individuals and families we serve.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The Riverside County CoC, Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funders, and recipients collaborate and coordinate to avoid duplication of services and to provide the most effective use of HUD funding. The CoC has established quality standards for emergency shelter and performance standards for shelter and transitional housing. All projects are evaluated annually to identify any performance issues and to provide technical support to administer the projects adequately.

ESG funds are awarded county-wide through a competitive process following federal guidelines. The County consults with the CoC to provide ESG funding recommendations in order to work in collaboration in targeting efforts to those who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless to eliminate and prevent homelessness. In 2022-23, consultation was extended to include the traditional surveys but also meetings with CoC staff and representatives to review the needs and gaps in assistance throughout Riverside County. ESG funding continues to be allocated to help address a wide range of opportunities to align with the Continuum of Care (CoC) Program designed to promote communitywide commitment to ending homelessness. Future goals have been established to conduct meetings to determine the needs, map areas of homeless from the PIT count, gap analysis data, and GIS reporting of locations of services.

The County provided \$1,89,576 from General Funds to support four (4) emergency shelters in the County. All agreements between the four projects have been renewed and will continue until fiscal year 2024-2025. The 2024 Housing Inventory Count (HIC) reported that 1,808 persons experiencing homelessness were sheltered through Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing programs.

HMIS data are reviewed to determine whether people are staying in programs or exiting to permanent housing. HMIS also tracks participants' income increase to determine their progress toward self-sufficiency.

As part of the 2024 HUD CoC Program Competition, HUD continues to encourage CoC's to carefully review the transitional housing projects within their geographic area for cost-effectiveness, performance, and for the number and type of eligibility criteria to determine if rapid re-housing might be a better model for the CoC's geographic area. HUD also continues to offer a Domestic Violence (DV) Bonus for rapid re-housing (RRH), joint transitional housing, and rapid re-housing (Joint TH and PH/RRH) projects targeted to serve people fleeing domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking.

In complying with HEARTH requirements, the County of Riverside HWS, in coordination with the CoC, has reassessed the shelter programs currently receiving ESG funding. In FY 2023/2024, 51.6% of ESG funds were used to provide outreach and emergency shelter and 40.9% for rapid re-housing activities. The future direction is to increase the percentage of rapid re-housing and homelessness prevention. The ESG Written Standards were updated to include additional requirements for complying with the Coordinated Entry System (CES), working toward a low-barrier approach to housing, and participate in a data sharing network. ESG recipients are required to utilize the Coordinated Intake and Assessment System provided through County of Riverside CoC. Participating agencies are responsible for engaging chronically homeless individuals and families through a standardized vulnerability assessment and intake process.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

In 2024, the County received \$1,146,704 through the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) funded by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) which included \$383,079 for rental assistance, \$176,400 for mass/emergency shelter, \$330,042 for other foods and \$165,883 for other shelters.

The County of Riverside ESG, in collaboration with the CoC Membership, works toward connecting homeless clients to resources once exiting from publicly funded institutions through sub-recipients of Outreach Services, and Emergency Shelter programs. Non-profits connect with agencies to provide resources in housing individuals and families to reduce the amount of homelessness. Through collaboration between the CoC and HWS, a discharge policy is now in place between the with key public/private agencies, and other entities to outline roles/responsibilities and establish a coordinated and collaborative discharge planning system in the county. Participating agencies are HWS, County Department of Behavioral Health, Hospital Association of Southern California (coordinator of Riverside County hospitals), Riverside County Sheriff's Dept., Riverside County Veterans' Services, and Community Connect 2-1-1. ESG funding is also utilized to support youth facilities which provide housing, educational services, and counseling to youth.

The County of Riverside ESG is a member of the Riverside County CoC which has representation from public and private agencies that specifically address the housing, health, social, employment and education needs of individuals, families, and youth experiencing or at risk of homelessness.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

HUD requires all CoCs to utilize the System Performance Measures (SPM) to help communities gauge their progress in preventing and ending homelessness and provide a complete picture of how well a community is achieving this goal. The SPM includes reducing the number of homeless individuals and families, reducing the number of first time homeless, length of time homeless, successful permanent housing placement or retention, returns to homelessness, jobs, and income growth.

To assist homeless persons successful transition to permanent housing, the Riverside County CoC has increased the number of permanent housing beds in the county by increasing rapid re-housing assistance (through ESG and CoC Program funds), that gives short-term rental assistance and support services for housing location and stability; and permanent supportive housing (through CoC Program funds).

The U.S. Department of Veterans' Affairs (VA) continues to provide funding for the HUD – Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) program that provides rental assistance for homeless veterans and the Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) program that offers a range of supportive services to eligible veteran families that are designed. These services are designed to help homeless veterans and their families dins and sustain permanent housing and access the health care, mental heal treatment, substance use counseling, and other supports necessary to help them in their recover process and with their ability to maintain housing in the community.

<u>County of Riverside Housing and Workforce Solutions – COC</u>

HWS is comprised of employees who work collectively and in partnership with community-based organizations to serve the needs of the community. HWS interacts with people on many levels, thereby impacting their daily lives through childcare, education, employment, training, health and human services, homelessness, and housing. The department also serves as the lead agency and grantee for the Riverside County CoC Program.

The HWS-CoC is also the HUD grantee responsible for administering a Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) for the County of Riverside CoC and the HMIS lead organization. HWS has the responsibility to establish, support, and manage the HMIS in a manner that meets HUD's standards for data quality, privacy, security, and other requirements for organizations participating in HMIS.

Riverside County Continuum of Care (CoC)

The CoC is a network of private and public sector homeless service providers, designed to promote community-wide planning and to improve coordination and integration with mainstream resources and other community programs for people who are experiencing or at-risk of becoming homeless. The goal is to improve and expand the collection of data countywide, develop performance measurements, and allow for communities to collaborate and to tailor their own program to the strengths and challenges within the community.

The CoC is designed to organize and deliver housing and services to meet the specific needs of people who are homeless as they move to stable housing and maximum self-sufficiency. The prevailing CoC Program resulted from the Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing Act of 2009 (HEARTH), which consolidated the three separate McKinney-Vento homeless assistance programs (Supportive Housing Program, Shelter Plus Care Program, and Section 8 moderate Rehabilitation SRO Program) into a single grant program.

HWS regularly consults and coordinates the ESG funding priorities and allocation with the Riverside County CoC in addressing the needs of the homeless during the 2022-2023 program year and beyond. This joint effort has worked successfully in the past, and HWS pledges its continuing support of the endeavor.

The Riverside County CoC is a network of private and public sector homeless service providers, designed to promote community-wide planning and the strategic use of resources addressing homelessness. The CoC seeks to improve coordination and integration with mainstream resources and other community programs for people who are experiencing or are at-risk of becoming homeless, which include vulnerable populations such as persons with physical, mental health, and other disabilities. The Housing Authority of the County of Riverside (HACR) is a member of the CoC. As a member of the CoC, the HACR participates in the County's Coordinated Entry System (CES) which has created a shared and standardized method for connecting people experiencing homelessness to the resources available in each community. The CES assesses people's housingrelated needs, prioritizes them for resources, and links those in need to a range of types of assistance, including immediate shelter and longer-term housing-focused programs. Through this process, individuals and households are prioritized for housing assistance based on their vulnerability and worse-case housing needs. While households experiencing housing emergencies can connect to the Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program by contacting the HACR, vacancies are also set-aside and matched through the county's CES ensuring a path for those who may not be able to connect with the HACR directly.

Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing Program (VASH)

The VASH program is a partnership amongst HUD and the VA, in which the Housing Authority provides Section 8 vouchers and supportive services to homeless veterans with the goal of ending homelessness among veterans. Locally, the VASH program is a partnership between HACR and the Loma Linda VA Medical Center. In 2016, the Housing Authority of the County of Riverside and other public and private partners were recognized for assisting the County in reaching "Functional-zero" veteran homelessness, becoming the first large county across the Country to achieve this federal benchmark. According to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), hitting functional zero means they've instituted "a well-coordinated and efficient community system that assures homelessness is rare, brief and non-recurring and no Veteran is forced to live on the street." During FY 23/24, 457 formerly homeless veterans and their families received permanent housing assistance through the HUDVASH program.

In partnership with affordable housing developers, the Housing Authority has awarded a total of 193 VASH Section 8 project-based vouchers (PBV) to developers for the development of

permanent supportive housing for Veterans. Of the VASH PBVs awarded, all 193 units are currently online. The VASH project-based vouchers will provide the housing stability needed first and foremost and the VA will provide onsite permanent supportive services to ensure that Veteran's receive the wrap around services needed to thrive in this environment.

HOPWA

The City of Riverside is the Grantee of the HOPWA Program for Riverside and San Bernardino County. The HACR serves as a Project Sponsor and administers the HOPWA Program through the entire County of Riverside. The goal of the HOPWA program is to assist low-income individuals and or families who live with HIV/ AIDS with housing subsidies in combination with supportive services. Through HOPWA the HACR was able to house 81 households with permanent housing and assist a total of 100 households during FY 23/24. The HOPWA program has the capacity to serve 95 households. Additionally, the HACR is subcontracted with the Desert Aids Project, Foothill Aids Project, and True Evolution. With the assistance and support of our subcontractors, housing was maintained and approved for 81 households. Our subcontractors are also able to assist with move-in costs, Short Term Rental Mortgage and Utility Assistance, Permanent Housing Placements, and emergency hotel/motel stays.

Cal-Works Housing Support Program (HSP)

The HSP program addresses the housing needs of homeless families with children who are currently receiving TANF assistance. The program is a collaboration between DPSS and HACR. HACR provides housing navigation, housing counseling, and short/medium-term rental subsidies in an effort to stabilize these families as quickly as possible. This allows them to take advantage of the TANF-related services provided by DPSS. The program assisted 460 households into permanent housing during program year 2023-2024.

Emergency Housing Voucher (EHV)

The Emergency Housing Voucher (EHV) program is funded through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 and aims to decrease homelessness and assist in obtaining decent, safe and sanitary housing in order to assist individuals and families who are homeless, at-risk of homelessness, fleeing, or attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking, or were recently homeless or have a high risk of housing instability.

The Housing Authority of the County of Riverside (HACR) was granted 354 EHV vouchers and with the collaboration and partnership of HACR, Continuums of Care (COC) and Victim Service Providers (VSP's) The EHV program has successfully housed a total of 324 families to date. In 2023 EHV housed 151 families. So far in 2024 EHV has housed a total of 64 families and has assisted a total of 336 households during the 23/24 FY. EHV is currently at 95.01% utilization.

HHAP - Homeless Housing Assistance & Prevention Program

The HHAP Program provides rapid rehousing to homeless households throughout Riverside County. Services include financial assistance towards rental application, credit check fees, move-in costs, security and utility deposits, rental and utility assistance and emergency shelter. Participants are linked to a case manager who assists in the development of an Individual Service Plan (ISP) and meets with participants regularly to reach self-sufficiency goals as outlined in their ISP. The program successfully case managed 23 households and of the 23, successfully placed 20 into housing during the 2023-2024 program year.

ERF – Encampment Resolution Funding Program (Santa Ana and San Jacinto river bottom)

The ERF Program provides emergency shelter and rapid rehousing to homeless encampments in the Santa Ana and San Jacinto River Bottoms. Services include financial emergency shelter in hotels, assistance towards rental application, credit check fees, move-in costs, security and utility deposits, rental and utility assistance. Participants are linked to a case manager who assists in the development of an Individual Service Plan (ISP) and meets with participants regularly to reach self-sufficiency goals. The program successfully case managed 56 households and of the 56, successfully placed 44 into housing during the 2023-2024 program year.

Mainstream

The 811 Mainstream Voucher program encourages partnerships with health and human service agencies with a demonstrated capacity to coordinate voluntary services and supports to enable individuals to live independently in the community. Mainstream is aimed to assist non-elderly persons with disabilities (Ages 18-62) who reside within the County of Riverside. The eligible household member DOES NOT need to be the head of household and the applicants housing status must be one of the following:

- At-risk of homelessness
- Homeless
- Exiting institutional setting
- At-risk of entering an institutional or other segregated setting

For FY 23/24 Mainstream housed 166 households and assisted a total of 184 households during the FY.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

HACR no longer operates a public housing program, and all 469 units were converted over to Project Based Voucher units with ownership transferred to Riverside Community Housing Corp.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

In order to encourage and improve communication between PHA staff and residents, the following was implemented:

- Customer Service Surveys were available to residents at Housing Authority office appointments and mailed out to them with their annual re-certification packets. For the 2023 calendar year, 172 surveys were turned in with 1,181 survey questions answered. 99.7% were favorable responses.
- Resources and information are provided to residents who are looking into homeownership opportunities. Housing Choice Voucher participants are encouraged to enroll in the Family Self-Sufficiency Program. The FSS Program emphasizes the importance of achieving goals and obtaining regular full-time employment. As FSS participants earned income increases, they will pay a higher portion of their rent and the Housing Authority will pay less. The cost savings by the Housing Authority is deposited into an interest-bearing escrow savings account. This escrow account is available to the FSS participant upon completion of the FSS Program. Some program graduates have used this escrow savings account as a down payment towards their first home.

HACR operates on the premise that affordable housing is not the end goal for a family, but rather, a steppingstone to reach full sufficiency to market-rate housing. The ultimate goal is for the Agency's families to successfully graduate to homeownership. To actively engage residents in this goal, the agency has taken the following actions:

- 1. Regular engagement of participants through specialized self-sufficiency coaches funded through HUD's Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) program.
- 2. Providing outreach and information to all assisted families and the public on community homeownership initiatives and credit counseling agencies.
- 3. Working collaboratively with our local Habitat for Humanity and other housing developers to provide participants with targeted homeownership opportunities.
- 4. The County's First Time Home Buyer (FTHB) program is available to assist in homeownership.

All participants of the Housing Choice Voucher Program are eligible to join the HCV Family Self Sufficiency (FSS) Program. The FSS Program employs seven (7) full-time FSS Coordinators to work one on one with FSS Families in providing the guidance and referral services to assist them on their journey to self-sufficiency. In FY 2023/2024, there were fifteen (15) FSS Graduates.

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

HACR has been recognized by HUD as a "High" performer for the last nineteen (19) years through the Section Eight Management Assessment Program (SEMAP).

According to HUD, there are approximately 3,300 public housing agencies (PHAs) in the United States. SEMAP is used to remotely measure performance and administration of the housing choice voucher program. SEMAP was designed to improve program performance and helps HUD to target monitoring and assistance to PHA programs that need the most improvement. SEMAP measures fourteen (14) key areas of performance to show whether PHAs help eligible families to afford decent rental units at a reasonable subsidy cost as intended by Federal housing legislation.

The fourteen (14) key indicators of PHA performance are:

- 1. Proper selection of applicants from the housing choice voucher waiting list
- 2. Sound determination of reasonable rent for each unit leased
- 3. Establishment of payment standards within the required range of the HUD fair market rent
- 4. Accurate verification of family income
- 5. Timely annual reexaminations of family income
- 6. Correct calculation of the tenant share of the rent and the housing assistance payment
- 7. Maintenance of a current schedule of allowances for tenant utility costs
- 8. Ensure units comply with the housing quality standards before families enter into leases and PHAs enter into housing assistance contracts
- 9. Timely annual housing quality inspections
- 10. Performing of quality control inspections to ensure housing quality
- 11. Ensure that landlords and tenants promptly correct housing quality deficiencies
- 12. Ensure that all available housing choice vouchers are used
- 13. Expand housing choice outside areas of poverty or minority concentration
- 14. Enroll families in the family self-sufficiency (FSS) program as required and help FSS families achieve increases in employment income

HUD will annually assign each PHA a rating on each of the fourteen (14) indicators and an overall performance rating of high, standard, or troubled. If a PHA does not perform adequately on any of the fourteen (14) indicators or is assigned an overall performance rating of troubled, these cases require corrective action. HUD will conduct on-site reviews of PHAs rated troubled to assess the magnitude and seriousness of the problems. The PHA must implement a thorough corrective action plan that HUD will monitor, to ensure improvement in program management.

The SEMAP Certification for FY 2023/2024 was submitted to HUD's Los Angeles Field Office for review on 8/15/2024. We are currently waiting for the HUD Los Angeles Field Office to issue the SEMAP Score for FY 2023/2024 and anticipate being awarded the High Performer designation for the 20th consecutive year.

CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

The dissolution of redevelopment agencies fundamentally altered affordable housing finance in California. Redevelopment funds provided a fairly predictable source of funds for affordable housing development. Affordable housing developers are now left with access to the County's CDBG and HOME funding. Affordable housing developers must be capable of negotiating successful critical paths in their efforts to increase the supply of affordable housing.

The County uses a multifaceted strategy to address barriers to affordable housing. Limited resources dictate that strategies be focused on the most effective tools possible. A major focus involves using both financial and processing assistance to maximize as many housing units as possible. This approach allows the County to quantify affordable housing production and make adjustments to development strategies as necessary.

The County assistance includes implementation of the following programs:

<u>Project Ombudsman</u>: This program involves designating a staff liaison or Ombudsman to work with affordable housing developers and their representatives.

<u>Gap Financing</u>: Gap financing offers financial assistance through grants, below-market-interest-rate loans, and other favorable repayment terms.

<u>Fee Subsidies</u>: Under certain circumstances, the County will subsidize the payment of development fees.

Transportation Uniform Mitigation (TUMF) Fee Exemption: County Ordinance Number 673, known as the Transportation Uniform Mitigation Fee Ordinance, sets the fee schedule that requires that all new development bear its fair share cost for the County to construct or acquire the needed facilities and preserve open space, wildlife, and their habitats. The county is a member of the Agency of the Coachella Valley Association of Governments (CVAG). Entities reached a consensus to develop a plan whereby the shortfall in funds needed to enlarge the capacity of the Regional System of Highways and Arterials within CVAG's jurisdiction would be made up in part by a Transportation Uniform Mitigation Fee (Ordinance Number 673). The fee would be imposed on future residential, commercial, and industrial development within the jurisdiction with exemptions to the following developments: (1) Low and lower-income residential housing, including single-

family homes, apartments, and mobile homes built for those whose income is no more than 80% of the median income in the San Bernardino-Riverside Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area and as determined and approved by the County. The sales or rental price shall not exceed the affordability criteria as established under HUD Section 8 guidelines. (2) Within the C-R Zone (Rural Commercial) of the unincorporated area of the Coachella Valley.

<u>Development Impact Fees (DIF) Fee Exemption:</u> County Ordinance Number 659 known as the Year 2001 Development Impact Fee Ordinance requires that all new development bear its fair share cost for the County to construct or acquire the needed facilities. In order to effectively implement the Riverside County Comprehensive General Plan, manage new residential, commercial, and industrial development, and address impacts caused by such development, certain facilities must be constructed or acquired and open space, wildlife, and their habitats must be preserved. In order for the County to construct or acquire the needed Facilities and preserve open space, wildlife, and their habitats, it is necessary to require that all new development bear its fair share cost of providing the Facilities, open, space and habitat reasonably needed to serve that development (Ordinance Number 659).

The Board exempts imposing fees on second units on existing single-family lots that may contribute to the need for certain of the Facilities. At this time and in this regard the board finds that second units: (1) provide a cost-effective means of serving development through the use of existing infrastructure, as contrasted to requiring the construction of new costly infrastructure to serve development in undeveloped areas; (2) provide relatively affordable housing for low and moderate income households without public subsidy; and (3) provide a means for purchasers of new or existing homes to meet payments on high interest loans.

Both TUMF and DIF Fee exemptions allow building of affordable housing to be less costly and promotes development of affordable housing.

<u>Public Opposition as a Barrier to Affordable Housing</u>: The County will continue to educate the public about the social and economic benefits of affordable housing.

<u>Fair Housing as a Barrier to Affordable Housing</u>: The County will continue to affirmatively further fair housing county-wide.

<u>Tax Policies</u>: The County keeps property taxes at a minimum and does not have a residential or business utility tax.

<u>Fast Track and Priority Processing</u>: The intent of this program is to expedite the construction of affordable housing projects through all phases of the approval process.

Reduction of rent burden in the Coachella Valley: The County's Department of Housing and Workforce Solutions partnered with Lift to Rise to fund efforts to reduce the number of people

who are rent burdened in the Coachella Valley region. The County has set a goal to create 9,881 units of affordable housing over the next ten (10) years to address this issue that plagues the region. The County was one of six (6) multi-sector collaborations selected to participate in the implementation phase of Connect Capital, a Center of Community Investment (CCI) that was made it possible by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF).

To achieve this goal the team is partnering with various stakeholders in the region and focusing on the following:

- Act on the following policy areas: Streamlined Development Approval Process, density Intensification/density bonus, and reduction in development/impact fees
- Creation of resident leadership table for community input towards the shared goal Bringing private and public investment to the region.

Housing Elements analysis of existing and projected housing needs: The County's Transportation Land Management Agency and the HWS coordinated the preparation of the Housing Element, with comprehensive housing policies, goals, and programs. The Housing Element includes an analysis of existing and projected housing needs; an analysis of potential governmental constraints; residential land inventory; housing policies; programs; and quantified objectives to address housing needs.

SB 2 Planning Grant Funds: The County's Transportation Land Management Agency received SB 2 Funding grants from, The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD), which provides funding and technical assistance to all local governments in California to help cities and counties prepare, adopt, and implement plans and process improvements that streamline housing approvals and accelerate housing production. County Ordinance Amendments: The County's Transportation, Land Management Agency in partnership with the Housing Authority of the County of Riverside, the Project Ombudsman, and community stakeholders have worked to streamline existing planning processes for the benefit of increasing affordable housing to the Farmworker community in the eastern Coachella Valley.

The following are processes and ordinances that have been amended to accomplish the acceleration of housing production:

- Amendment of Ordinance 348 to include the use of
 - Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs)
 - Junior Accessory Dwelling Units (Junior ADUs)
 - o Multiple Owners Group (MOG) Housing
 - Ranchete Housing

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

One of the most important steps in addressing obstacles to community development is identification, assessment, and evaluation. In Riverside County, obstacles to CPD-funded activities include location and logistics, language and culture, limited resources, and program restrictions and regulations. Unfortunately, these barriers and challenges hinder the development and implementation of important programs and facilities intended to serve those most in need.

As in most jurisdictions, the largest obstacle to meeting underserved needs is funding. Development and service provision costs have been increasing, causing a more significant gap between funding and need. To address this obstacle, the County strongly encourages its own agencies, as well as cooperating cities and other sub-recipients, to seek other resources, collaborate and build new partnerships, and leverage additional funding whenever possible from local, State, Federal, and private sources. The county urges CPD-funded programs and services to be flexible while being as efficient and effective as possible to achieve expected performance outcomes.

Riverside County is geographically very large; many of the targeted lower-income communities are located in remote rural areas, suburban fringe areas, and within large urban settings. An effective tool used by the County is the community-based forum. These include the Community Councils and Municipal Advisory Councils. These non-elected public bodies provide ideal forums for residents and other stakeholders to express their concerns and assess community development needs. Also, the County and other organizations have the opportunity to directly discuss programs, plans, and projects during these meetings.

The County encourages the participation of all its citizens, including reaching out to minorities and non-English speaking persons, previously and current homeless persons, and persons with disabilities. To provide additional assistance, the County and nearly all CPD sub-recipients have bilingual staff sensitive to cultural traditions, issues, and values. The County makes every effort to ensure that Limited English Proficient (LEP) persons have meaningful access to federally funded programs and services as is required under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. In areas where the County has determined a substantial non-English speaking population within its jurisdiction, public notices, including notifications of funding cycles and Citizen Participation meetings, are published in English and the appropriate language(s). Additionally, it is the policy of Riverside County that there shall be no discrimination against persons because of race, religion, age, creed, color, sex, disability, sexual orientation, national origin, marital status, veteran's status, or political belief or affiliation, and that equal opportunity and access to facilities shall be available to all. The County is committed to providing equal access to its programs, services, and activities for all persons, including persons with disabilities. Special accommodations or materials in alternative format, as required by Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, are available upon request.

County staff has also responded to increased programmatic and administrative demands by creating greater internal efficiencies and realigning program and service delivery internally and within its provider network. Staff worked collaboratively with County officials, as well as with other County departments to identify projects that met Federal community development program eligibility and timely draw-down requirements. Staff continues to fine-tune this approach to help ensure projects are ready to go and project funds are spent quickly and effectively.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The Department of Environmental Health has been making efforts to reduce lead-based paint hazards as part of the Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (CLPPP). During Fiscal Year 2024, the CLPP Program has addressed lead-based paint hazards in the following ways:

- 1. Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program Under the CLPP Program, Riverside County Departments of Environmental Health (DEH) and Public Health (PH) worked in conjunction to test and identify children who have been exposed to lead. The CLPPP team worked together to identify sources of lead-hazard exposure in a total of twenty-seven (27) households during fiscal year 2024. During these investigations, the Department of Environmental Health assisted a total of two (2) households to reduce identified lead-based paint hazards through the CLPP Program.
- 2. Lead Hazard Reduction Compliance and Enforcement Program State law, as implemented by the 2002 Senate Bill 460, grants authority to local health departments to require the enforcement and prosecution of persons who refuse to abate lead hazards in housing. The Lead Hazard Control Program is funded under this grant and implements SB 460 which allowed changes to State health and housing laws to make creating lead hazards a crime. There were two (2) complaints received by the DEH during fiscal year 2024.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The County has continued to address the issue of poverty by enhancing the quality of life of its residents. The County offers job training and retraining opportunities through various Workforce Development Center (WDC) programs. WDC programs include vocational training, construction trade certification for (HVAC, electrical, plumbing, and welding), career counseling, mock interviews, training, computer access, resume building, job fairs, assistance with job searches, and supportive services.

In partnership with the Housing Authority of the County of Riverside, WDC programs are marketed to Section 8 recipients whenever annual income certifications are sent out via mail. In addition, the County partners with the Californian Family Life Center (CFLC), a non-profit agency that provides job training and education to youth ages 16-24 in a variety of construction trades. It is the goal of the County to continue these programs that enhance the quality of life and increase job opportunities for its residents.

The County continues its efforts to promote HUD Section 3 contracting and hiring for both the CDBG, HOME, and HOME ARP programs through the online Section 3 website.

The County requires all contractors with either CDBG or HOME-funded construction contracts of \$200,000 or more to comply with Section 3 requirements (24 CFR Part 75) and to visit the Section 3 website for resources, certifications, implementation plan, Section 3 guide, and related forms. To ensure that economic opportunities, most importantly employment, generated by certain HUD financial assistance shall be directed to low- and very low-income persons, particularly those who are recipients of government assistance for housing or residents of the community in which the Federal assistance is spent.

For 2023-2024, there were no reported Section 3 hiring or subcontracting for the HOME program. For 2023-2024, there were no reported Section 3 hiring or subcontracting for the CDBG program.

The County recognizes the long-term benefits of investing in economic development. Job creation, micro-enterprise assistance, business finance assistance, and technical assistance to businesses are all classified as economic development. The County funds and supports activities that create and retain jobs and have a direct community and financial impact. Activities undertaken in the program year 2023-2024 utilized funds to reduce persons in poverty and improve residents' quality of life and economic stability, either directly or indirectly.

Economic Development for Riverside County is a collaborative partnership between Riverside County's Office of Economic Development (RivCoED), its twenty-eight (28) cities, and several regional Economic Development Corporations to implement business attraction and retention programs. The partnership is called Team Riverside County (TRC). Collaboration and leveraging financial and human resources are the program's cornerstone principles. TRC's main objectives are to promote Riverside County's business opportunities to national and international markets, develop effective networks within industry sectors, and lead generation.

Business Financing

Revolving Loan Fund Program (RLF)

On August 23, 2016, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Riverside (County) approved a Financial Assistance Award from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration (USEDA) to establish a Revolving Loan Fund in the County. The purpose of the fund was to support economic development and provide for a source of business capital. The Board of Supervisors also approved establishing the County of Riverside Economic Development Revolving Loan Fund Program (RLF Program). The total loan pool of \$1,528,633 was capitalized with the grant from USEDA (80% of total) and matched by County of Riverside Economic Development funds (20% of total). Since the inception of the RLF Program, the County of Riverside, in collaboration with a fiscal agent, has provided small business loans to Riverside County private, for-profit businesses with 25 or fewer employees.

On June 27, 2023, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Riverside (County) approved a Second Amendment to the Subrecipient Agreement with AMPAC Business Capital for Revolving Loan Fund Program microloan services. There were no loans made in the 2023-2024 FY. The Riverside County Office of Economic Development (RivCoED) will begin new loan applications in the Fall of 2024, in the amounts of \$15,000-\$50,000 with a 5.00% interest rate and payment terms of up to 5 years.

During the 2023-2024 fiscal year, Revolving Loan Fund statistics were as follows:

- 1 Fully Repaid Loan totaling \$140,000.00
- 2 Loans were structured totaling \$125,000.00

Riverside County Small Business Thrive Program

The Thrive Program is an American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Economic Recovery Program providing small business start-up assistance and support for existing businesses to stabilize and grow by providing technical assistance and grants in the amounts of \$1,500, \$2,500, and \$5,000 for operational costs. Thrive consists of 13 distinct training programs in 9 business industry categories for ecosystem development and business support. During the 2023-24 fiscal year, the Thrive program statistics were the following:

- 22 specialized training events were held.
- 2682 attendees participated in the specialized trainings.
- 185 grants awarded, totaling \$470,000.

Business Seminars

Assisting businesses with the myriad of services available to them is a key principle of the division's goals and objectives. The Office of Economic Development continued its business seminar series by partnering with the Inland Empire Small Business Development Center, the Coachella Valley Small Business Development Center, and the Temecula Entrepreneurial Resource Center to deliver seminars on topics such as:

- How to Start a Business in English and Spanish
- Small Business Financing
- QuickBooks for Small Businesses
- Payroll Taxes and Unemployment Insurance for Businesses
- Procurement Opportunities
- Veteran Specific Programming

Seminars were held across the county, and several hundred business owners or entrepreneurs were presented with important resources and tools to help them start or expand in Riverside County.

Additional Business Seminars

California Baptist University Family Business Center

RivCoED, in partnership with the California Baptist University Family Business Center, is supporting family-owned businesses by offering workshops and seminars. These sessions aim to identify unique opportunities and challenges and educate on the importance of constructing a solid succession plan.

Additional Technical Assistance:

Coachella Valley Small Business Development Center

In 2016, the Office of Economic Development applied to be the operator of the Coachella Valley Small Business Development Center (SBDC) on behalf of the U.S. Small Business Administration and SBDC Lead Center, Cal State Fullerton. As the successful applicant, the Office of Economic Development will receive over \$355,000 in federal and state annual funding to provide in-depth, high-quality assistance to small business owners and prospective small business owners in complex areas that require specialized expertise. These areas may include, but are not limited to: management, marketing, financing, accounting, strategic planning, regulation and taxation, capital formation, venture capital, procurement, human resource management, production, operations, economic and business data analysis, engineering, technology transfer, innovation and research, new product development, product analysis, plant layout and design, computer application,

business law and referral, exporting, office automation, site selection, or any other areas of assistance required to promote small business growth, expansion, and productivity in the county.

During the 2023-2024 fiscal year, Coachella Valley SBDC statistics were as follows:

Business Assistance NOW Program (BANP)

To date, we have direct assisted nearly 1400 businesses. <u>The Business Assistance NOW Program</u> supports businesses with occupancy permit assistance, financial resources, hiring, training, and more. The Office of Economic Development business support team works closely with the TLMA Ombudsman to provide a clear path in navigating the Planning and Building and Safety departments to get businesses established and growing within Riverside County. Veterans Business Resources NOW Program

RivCoED's <u>Veterans Business Resources NOW Program</u> provides vital resources, workshops, and business assistance to veterans and veteran entrepreneurs, including access to capital, technical assistance, hiring and training, permit and planning assistance, and much more.

Strategic Partnerships & Organizational Leadership

Riverside County's involvement has forged critical partnerships with internal and external partners that allow it to be at the forefront of economic development activity at the state and local level. Riverside County Workforce Development Division

The County recognizes the long-term benefits of investing in workforce development. Vocational training, job search assistance, job creation, microenterprise assistance, business finance assistance, and technical assistance to businesses are all classified as workforce development. The County funds and supports activities that create and retain jobs and have a direct community and financial impact. Activities undertaken in fiscal year (FY) 2023-24 utilized funds in an effort to reduce the number of persons living in poverty, improve the quality of life and economic stability for residents (either directly or indirectly), and support the growth and resilience of Riverside County employers. These activities primarily took place at Riverside County's Workforce Development

Centers, known as America's Job Centers of California, and at various partner locations throughout the County.

The Riverside County Workforce Development Division achieved the following in FY 2023-24:

Job Seeker Services

- 29,800 new and returning job seekers were provided with employment and career services
- 426 new and returning Veterans received job seeker services
- 740 job seekers entered industry-related vocational training

Employer Services

- The Employer Services team meaningfully engaged with businesses 900 times
- 113 employers received a total of \$3,621,283 in cash flow assistance in the form of wage reimbursements for 476 newly hired employees through the On-the-Job Training Program
- WDC participated in or hosted 36 job fairs, assisting 528 employers and 2,831 job seekers

Youth Services

- 686 new and returning youth, ages 16-24, received long-term, comprehensive services, including educational assistance and preparation for entering the workforce.
- 314 youth, ages 16-24, received paid work experience

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The formation of sustainable partnerships and collaboration is essential to maintaining a strong institutional structure for meeting affordable housing, community, social, and economic development needs of low- and moderate-income persons throughout the county. The institutional structure is comprised of various government agencies, participating cities, nonprofit organizations, and other private and public establishments. The relationships and interaction of these organizations as they deliver programs and undertake activities are known as the County's housing and community development delivery system. The county will make every effort to improve institutional structure by continuing to build and improve relationships with local service providers and working with other local jurisdictions in order to increase collaboration and make processes more efficient and standardized. The County will continue to assist the homeless and those at risk of becoming homeless by supporting non-profits that offer solutions and services to the homeless.

The County's Department of Housing and Workforce Solutions (HWS) administers the Community Planning and Development programs. Staff is specifically responsible for the administration, implementation, and compliance of programs funded by these sources. The County maintains

active partnerships with many other agencies and organizations, which is an integral part of the institutional structure and success of the CPD-funded projects and programs.

<u>County of Riverside Housing and Workforce Solutions – Community and Housing</u> <u>Development (CHD)</u>

HWS is comprised of employees who work collectively and in partnership with community-based organizations to serve the needs of the community. HWS serves as the lead agency in coordinating and monitoring the use of Federal funds and is responsible for the administration of CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs. CPD funds are allocated within the five Supervisorial Districts, thirteen Cooperating Cities, and two Metropolitan Cities. Individual staff members have been assigned to work in each of these areas and participate in a variety of activities at the local level.

The Housing Authority of the County of Riverside (HACR)

HACR is empowered under the State Housing Authority Laws to provide safe and sanitary housing for low-income persons. HACR provides the following programs: Housing Choice Voucher Tenant Based, Project Based Rental Assistance Program (10,212 vouchers, which includes 203 Mainstream Vouchers, 605 VASH Tenant Based Vouchers, 1,134 Project Based Voucher units of which 193 are Veteran Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) Project Based units), a Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) program (Section 8 participants), Housing Opportunities for Persons With Aids (HOPWA), and also works with the Child Protective Services Division of the Department of Public Services assisting families whose children have been removed or at risk of being removed due to lack of housing. In addition, the Housing Authority of the County of Riverside (HACR) was designated as the Successor Agency of the redevelopment housing functions. As of February 1, 2012, all RDA housing projects and activities were transferred to HACR.

Community Development Housing Organizations (CHDO)

The County is required to allocate a minimum of 15% of its HOME funds for use by certified Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs) for new construction, acquisition, and/or rehabilitation of affordable rental housing. CHDOs are required to recertify with the County annually to be eligible to apply for HOME funds. To recertify, CHDOs must meet the guidelines defined in Section 92.2 of the HOME final rule, 24 CFR Part 92.

In allocating CHDO funds, the County requires CHDOs to direct their activities towards very low-and low-income households. These activities include providing affordable housing for low-income households and appropriate housing for elderly and disabled households. The County is in compliance and anticipates exceeding the 15% threshold.

<u>County of Riverside Housing and Workforce Solutions – COC</u>

HWS is comprised of employees who work collectively and in partnership with community-based organizations to serve the needs of the community. HWS interacts with people on many levels, thereby impacting their daily lives through childcare, education, employment, training, health and human services, homelessness, and housing. The department also serves as the lead agency and grantee for the Riverside County CoC Program.

The HWS-CoC is also the HUD grantee responsible for administering a Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) for the County of Riverside CoC and the HMIS lead organization. HWS has the responsibility to establish, support, and manage the HMIS in a manner that meets HUD's standards for data quality, privacy, security, and other requirements for organizations participating in HMIS.

Riverside County Continuum of Care (CoC)

The CoC is a network of private and public sector homeless service providers, designed to promote community-wide planning and to improve coordination and integration with mainstream resources and other community programs for people who are experiencing or at-risk of becoming homeless. The goal is to improve and expand the collection of data countywide, develop performance measurements, and allow for communities to collaborate and to tailor their own program to the strengths and challenges within the community.

The CoC is designed to organize and deliver housing and services to meet the specific needs of people who are homeless as they move to stable housing and maximum self-sufficiency. The prevailing CoC Program resulted from the Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing Act of 2009 (HEARTH), which consolidated the three separate McKinney-Vento homeless assistance programs (Supportive Housing Program, Shelter Plus Care Program, and Section 8 Moderate Rehabilitation SRO Program) into a single grant program.

HWS regularly consults and coordinates the ESG funding priorities and allocation with the Riverside County CoC in addressing the needs of the homeless during the 2023-2024 program year and beyond. This joint effort has worked successfully, and HWS pledges its continuing support of the endeavor.

The Riverside County CoC is a network of private and public sector homeless service providers designed to promote community-wide planning and the strategic use of resources addressing homelessness. The CoC seeks to improve coordination and integration with mainstream resources and other community programs for people who are experiencing or are at risk of becoming

homeless, which include vulnerable populations such as persons with physical and mental health and other disabilities. The Housing Authority of the County of Riverside (HACR) is a member of the CoC. As a member of the CoC, the HACR participates in the County's Coordinated Entry System (CES), which has created a shared and standardized method for connecting people experiencing homelessness to the resources available in each community. The CES assesses people's housing-related needs, prioritizes them for resources, and links those in need to a range of types of assistance, including immediate shelter and longer-term housing-focused programs. Through this process, individuals and households are prioritized for housing assistance based on their vulnerability and worse-case housing needs. While households experiencing housing emergencies can connect to the Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program by contacting the HACR, vacancies are also set-aside and matched through the county's CES ensuring a path for those who may not be able to connect with the HACR directly.

Home Enhancement Program (HEP)

HWS staff manages activities for the Home Enhancement Program (HEP) and community cleanup events in collaboration with county-wide community leaders, government agencies, and youth organizations. Our staff provides home rehabilitation services to low-income households through the Youth Force and Home Enhancement programs. The Youth Force program allows Non-profit Youth organizations to raise funds while educating youth about the consequences of illegal dumping by participating in cleanup events that successfully remove rubbish from residential, vacant lots, and public properties that become a target for illegal dumping or excessive outside storage. A total of five (5) clean-up events were held, allowing eleven (11) non-profit youth organizations to participate in this program year.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds are used for services, activities, and projects in all five supervisorial districts, including the Home Enhancement Program (HEP). HEP grants assist twenty-seven (27) low-income homeowners in the Program Year 2023-2024 with the exterior repair of stick-built and modular (attached to private land) owner-occupied, single-family residences. Grants are limited to the cost of repairs relative to a property's health, safety, and Housing Quality Standards as defined by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. Home Enhancement grants do not exceed the amount of \$50,000 per residential property.

Code Enforcement

The County provides comprehensive community code enforcement activities through the Code Enforcement Department under the umbrella of the Transportation and Land Management Agency. This Division is responsible for inspecting and enforcing county ordinances relating to public nuisances, zoning violations, and other issues relevant to the needs of the Community Development Block Grant Assisted Code Enforcement (CACE) areas/communities. Code Enforcement continues to use CDBG funds to pay for costs associated with the enforcement of County of Riverside code ordinances as these relate to CACE unincorporated communities

in three Supervisorial Districts of Riverside County. Code Enforcement is identified as a priority, especially in the lower-income and blighted target areas throughout the County.

Code Enforcement implements CDBG Assisted Code Enforcement policies and procedures to address code violations based on priorities set by those code violations that pose a threat to public health and safety in primarily deteriorated residential areas. In the program year 2023-2024, the Code Enforcement Department, together with public/private sector improvements, continued to reverse the decline of blight in the CACE areas of the County of Riverside Supervisorial Districts, including the First, Second, Third, Fourth, and Fifth Districts.

The City of Lake Elsinore chose to participate in the County's Urban County program as a Joint Metro City/Urban County participant. As determined by HUD, the City's allocation for 2023-24 was \$595,254, with approximately thirteen percent (13%) retained by the County for administrating the City's CDBG program. Lake Elsinore funded six (6) projects (including countywide) for the 2023-24 program year and expended \$29,988.43 in CDBG funding on City projects, including public service and public facilities. The City of Murrieta chose to participate in the County's Urban County program as a Joint Metro City/Urban County participant. As determined by HUD, the City's allocation for 2023-24 was \$636,739, with approximately thirteen percent (13%) retained by the County for administrating the City's CDBG program. Murrieta funded nine (9) projects (including county-wide) for the 2023-24 program year and expended \$792,042.51 in CDBG funding on City projects, including public service, public facilities, and program administration.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Coordination efforts have been instrumental in meeting the wide-range of community development needs in the County. The County has taken the initiative to develop more opportunities and continues to encourage and support the formation of these joint efforts for projects and activities that will create viable, self-sufficient communities, decent, affordable housing, a suitable living environment, and expanded economic development opportunities for low-income persons.

The County strives to increase affordable housing collaborative efforts with public and private sector entities, numerous advisory agencies, Community Housing Development Organizations ("CHDOs"), lending institutions, service providers, the Office on Aging, Code Enforcement, California Housing and Community Development, Riverside University Health System (RUHS) - Behavioral Health and the Housing Authority of the County of Riverside.

Efforts to increase the participation of the CDBG, HOME, Low-income Tax Credit, Federal, State and other local housing program sources will be directed at:

- Strengthening the housing service delivery system by working more closely with partners such as the Housing Authority, RUHS and by collaborating with non-profit organizations;
- Integrating community development block grant housing programs;
- Increasing the involvement of the Community Council, Housing Review Committee, and the Municipal Advisory Council (MAC); and
- Working more closely with identified Community Housing Development Organizations ("CHDOs") as well as local city governments.

The County continues to expand its relationships with a variety of groups and agencies in an effort to better meet the needs of the community. Addressing the community, social, and economic development needs of low- and moderate-income people throughout Riverside County is a

comprehensive and daunting undertaking. No one agency or organization alone can successfully accomplish the task. The formation of sustainable partnerships and collaboration is essential. These efforts bring more than just leveraged financial resources to a project; they provide additional experience, knowledge, information, facilities, strategies, and other valuable resources.

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

The County completed a Fair Housing Impediment Study in June 2019. The 2019-2024 Analysis of Impediments revealed the following impediments that exist in the County:

- 1. Siting and Standards for Transitional and Supportive Housing
- 2. Discrimination against Persons with Disabilities

AI Recommendations and Actions Undertaken in Program Year 2023/2024

The implementation of the following recommendations, as identified in the 2019-2024 Fair Housing Impediment Study, helped ensure access to fair housing during 2023/2024 FY:

Impediment 1: Siting and Standards for Transitional and Supportive Housing

Recommendation:

• Implement Action 1.5c of the Housing Element to revise Ordinance 348 to include a definition of transitional housing and supportive housing that is consistent with State of California Health and Safety Code Sections 50675.14 and 50675.2; and revise the Ordinance to list transitional and supportive housing as permitted uses within residential zones.

Action:

• The County of Riverside Transportation and Land Management Agency in March of 2021 completed updating Ordinance No. 348, a zoning ordinance to add supportive and transitional housing as permitted uses by right in conformance with State law.

Impediment 2: <u>Discrimination against Persons with Disabilities</u>

Recommendation:

• It is recommended that the County provide for, under contract, multiple workshops per year for the next five years in locations throughout the County. These workshops should be focused on the rights of persons with disabilities as it relates to their ability to obtain and maintain housing. The content of these workshops should be tailored to landlords, tenants and government officials (e.g., code enforcement, Housing Authority staff, Homelessness Prevention and Workforce Solutions staff), including a general introduction to fair housing laws and discrimination, and then primarily focus on forms of discrimination against

- persons with disabilities, such as unreasonably denying or refusing to address requests for reasonable accommodation and modification.
- It is further recommended that the County continue contracting with a fair housing service provider for both discrimination and landlord-tenant services. Each annual contract should include metrics, benchmarks, and reporting requirements specific to this.

Action:

- Fair Housing Council of Riverside County is contracted to provide educational opportunities for property owners, property managers, and residents. These opportunities provide information concerning the law as it pertains to reasonable accommodations and reasonable modifications, which are some of the leading reasons why persons with disabilities encounter discrimination when seeking housing or attempting to maintain their housing.
- Information is disbursed through workshops, public services announcements, literature distribution, and through the provision of landlord-tenant mediation services to address potential discrimination before it occurs.
- Riverside Community Action Partnership collaborates with the community to empower individuals through education, wealth building, energy assistance, and advocacy, fostering self-sufficiency and a brighter future for all.

In accordance with HUD CPD program regulations, the County, as the Grantee, continually monitors all grant and sub-grant-supported activities. Monitoring Policies were developed and adopted in April 2006 through Administrative Program Notice 2006.01 to ensure compliance with 24 CFR 570.502 (CDBG) and 24 CFR 576.500 (ESG). Additionally, the County updated the monitoring policies on September 28, 2016, through Administrative Program Notice 2016.02, to ensure compliance with 2 CFR 200.328(a). The County has identified two separate yet related components of effective CPD Program monitoring: internal (HWS) and external (Sub-recipients). Internal monitoring encompasses the actions, procedures, and performance of HWS staff - primarily the CDBG staff assigned to CDBG, CDBG-CV, ESG, and ESG-CV. External or Sub-recipient monitoring is directed at those organizations or entities receiving CDBG or ESG funding. These include the cooperating cities and their sub-recipients, Sponsors (non-profits), and County Agencies. Monitoring can take a number of forms and can include telephone consultation, review of progress reports, performance measures, and on-site assessments.

The County acknowledges the importance and necessity of their own proficiency and internal monitoring of day-to-day activities associated with the administration of the CDP programs. This is best accomplished through training, policies and procedures, and internal auditing. The responsibility for monitoring subrecipient activities for compliance, financial management, and tracking program activity is assigned to the Program Managers, and the CDBG Program Administrator is responsible for oversight of the Program Managers' monitoring tasks.

To ensure that the subrecipients achieve their performance objectives, effective monitoring involves planning, implementation, and follow-up to assure compliance with applicable regulations governing the subrecipient's administrative, financial, and programmatic activities. The monitoring process of the CPD-funded programs consists of three levels of activities: desk, On-site (Level I), On-site (Level II), and Performance/Compliance Monitoring (Level III). At the beginning of the CDBG/ESG program year, Program Managers complete a Project (subrecipient) Risk Assessment for each activity to determine the appropriate level of monitoring actions necessary. Not all monitoring actions are conducted with the same comprehensiveness, detail, or thoroughness based on the risk level.

Remote monitoring of projects and subrecipients takes place on an ongoing basis, including the submission of reimbursement requests and required supporting documentation. All reimbursement requests and documentation are reviewed by staff for accuracy, completeness, and compliance with program guidelines and project implementation schedules. Staff examines progress reports and financial information submitted in order to ensure work is being carried out

as described in the application and agreement, to conduct risk assessments, to ensure production and accountability, and to evaluate each agency's organizational and project performance. Staff also performs frequent reviews of expenditures during the program year and may recommend OYAP amendments to facilitate timely expenditures. For substantial OYAP amendments, the Board of Supervisors approves the defunding of slow-moving activities and the reallocation of funds to other priority activities that can utilize the funds expeditiously.

Staff typically conducts on-site monitoring for all moderate and high-risk subrecipients. The on-site monitoring inspects for key project components, including an evaluation of the subrecipient's compliance with HUD program regulations by reviewing the program source documentation as it relates to the national objectives, conformance with the CDBG agreement, record-keeping systems, insurance documentation, procurement procedures, policies related to equipment and real property, a review of financial records, documentation, and client files, a tour of the facility or program when applicable, a review of subrecipient's program and financial policies/ procedures, and a review of the annual single audit required of those subrecipients. A site visit/monitoring sheet is kept in each project file. If a recipient is found in violation, a written notification of findings is sent, and a follow-up monitoring visit(s) is conducted, if necessary.

On large construction projects, program staff monitors minority business outreach, Davis-Bacon, Section 3 requirements, and project data collection. The Riverside County Board of Supervisors adopted an Affirmative Action Policy Statement to ensure compliance with Section 3. For projects subject to Davis-Bacon Labor Standards, in-house desk reviews and on-site labor compliance interviews are performed to ensure the wage compliance of all contractors. Labor compliance interviews are compared to payroll records submitted by contractors and subcontractors to verify wage compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act. In addition to on-site labor compliance interviews, the Federal Labor Standard Questionnaire form is occasionally sent to employees during the course of the project to ensure the proper payment of wages. All projects are inspected during construction to ensure that all work is in compliance with the originally proposed scope. Any additional work added through the Change Order process during the course of the project is also reviewed and approved to ensure the revised scope of work carried out is eligible for CDBG funding and that the project will ultimately meet a National Objective.

In order to assist and improve subrecipient monitoring activities, as well as maintain sufficient documentation of County monitoring actions, the following monitoring reports and resources will be utilized: Subrecipient Risk Assessment (2 CFR 200.331(b)), CDBG Program Monitoring Checklist, Project File Checklist, Quarterly Progress Reports, Subrecipient Monitoring Activity Report, and Internal Program Auditor/Monitor Reports. The County's current monitoring policy also makes reference to the Integrity Bulletin issued by the U.S. Department of HUD Office of the Inspector General. All subrecipient monitoring checklists, documents, reports, and records will be maintained for a period of at least five (5) years. All documentation is maintained in their designated location within the individual project files. For the cooperating cities, copies of all monitoring documentation will be placed in the individual city's General File as well as the specific project file.

The ESG program utilizes a monitoring process comparable to that of the CDBG program, as detailed above, to ensure compliance with 2 CFR 200.328(a). The four basic goals for oversight and monitoring of the progress and performance of ESG grantees/recipients include:

- Ensure that ESG funds are used effectively to assist homeless individuals and families and that the basic ESG program goals are met.
- Ensure compliance with ESG regulations and program requirements in the usage of funds and in carrying out program activities.
- Ensure complete and accurate client demographics are entered in HMIS.
- Enhance and develop the management capacity of grantees or recipients.

HOME Project Monitoring

The County of Riverside is entrusted with the responsibility to actively and continually monitor its portfolio of affordable housing projects. The County works with tenants and owners/operators to identify and promptly address any concerns or deficiencies through physical and document audits. The goal is to ensure safe, decent, affordable housing in accordance with building standards, funding source restrictions, and regulatory agreements. Reporting is completed as needed to ensure continued compliance with other lenders. The County performs monitoring of the housing assets listed in its portfolio in accordance with the Housing and Workforce Solutions Monitoring Policies and Procedures Manual for projects funded by HOME, NSP1, NSP3, PLHA, CalHome, CDBG, Bond, and RDA funding.

For HOME projects the goal is to verify compliance with applicable regulations:

- HOME requirements 24 CFR §92.504(a) -The participating jurisdiction must have and follow written policies, procedures, and systems, including a system for assessing the risk of activities and projects and a system for monitoring entities consistent with this section, to ensure that the requirements of this part are met
- HOME requirements regarding On-site inspection at 24 CFR §92.504(d)
- HOME requirements regarding Recordkeeping at 24 CFR §92.508
- HOME Program Property Standards 24 CFR §92.251
- HOME Qualification as affordable rental housing 24 CFR §92.252
- HOME Tenant protections and selection 24 CFR §92.253
- HOME VAWA (Violence Against Women Act) requirements 24 CFR §92.359
- HOME VAWA protections 24 CFR §5.2005

To ensure that housing projects meet established objectives, effective monitoring involves planning, implementation, and communication. The following methodology is used to promote effective monitoring: Fiscal Year Schedule and File Assessment, Compliance Review; Risk Analysis Determination, On-Site Monitoring; Fiscal year Compliance Determination, and Findings Resolution.

Each fiscal year, program staff conducts a Risk Assessment of each project. The risk assessment indicates projects that would benefit from a higher level of monitoring review. A calendar is established for on-site inspections for that fiscal year. Actions taken to review project compliance include desk review, cursory on-site review, and full on-site review.

The desk review is conducted for all projects for which the County has monitoring responsibility. The desk review consists of on-going submission of semiannual compliance reports (tenant checklists, rent roll), audited financial statements, and insurance certificates. This reporting and review are enacted throughout the entire affordability period. This reporting is submitted to demonstrate compliance with applicable contractual obligations and regulations.

The County administers a monitoring process that provides for the monitoring of all affordable housing development financed by Riverside County Housing and Workforce Solutions. The purpose of monitoring is to determine performance and includes compliance reports, financial and other recordkeeping documents, and correspondence related to the projects. For homeownership projects and programs such as the First Time Homebuyer Program (FTHB) annual self-certification forms are mailed out 30 days prior to the reporting due date. The Homeowner Self Certification Surveys are sent to 5% of the homeowner-assisted households via random selection.

For rental projects, a cursory on-site monitoring review consists of interaction with staff, document review, and a site walk. A full on-site audit includes a more thorough review of all program aspects including a physical inspection of no less than 20% of all HOME designated units. The on-site monitoring inspects for key project components, including program regulations, conformance with the HOME Agreement, recordkeeping systems, insurance documentation, affirmative fair housing marketing, lease agreements, a review of financial records, documentation, and client files, and a physical inspection of housing units and grounds. A record of all monitoring activities is kept for each project. All findings are communicated to the project proponents via written notification.

Contacts are maintained with all projects to ensure timely information distribution, including program updates, tenant complaints, and compliance deficiencies.

Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)

Describe the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.

The County's adopted Citizen Participation Plan (CPP) outlines and sets the minimum requirements for the development of the CAPER, criteria for amendments, public comments, provision of public hearings, meetings, publishing of the document and its availability to the public, access to records, provision of technical assistance, procedures to handle complaints, and the monitoring and evaluation responsibilities. The County strongly supports and encourages participation, input, cooperation, and feedback in the administration of its CPD-funded programs and the development of the CAPER. The CP process is explicitly designed to accommodate and encourage participation by low- and moderate-income residents, residents of low- and moderate-income neighborhoods, minority groups, persons with limited English skills, and persons with disabilities. Bilingual interpretation and accommodation services and assistance for those with disabilities are provided upon request.

It was determined that the most appropriate and effective methods to obtain input from residents, service providers, and other interested persons concerning community development needs, issues, and opportunities was through the County's ongoing participation in community-based task forces, committees, internet outreach, Community-based meetings, public notices, public hearings, consultation feedback requests, memorandum of participation, and through the Urban County Participating Cities. Persons unable to participate in any aspect of the CP process were invited to provide input and/or submit comments to the County.

Prior to the CAPER submission, the County made it available for review on our department's website. We also published a public notice in English and Spanish in a newspaper of general distribution advising residents of the availability of the CAPER for public review and comment. The CAPER was made available for review on the Department's website, www.rivcohws.org, for the required 15-day public comment period beginning September 11, 2024. Interested persons could submit written, oral, or electronically sent comments until 4:00 PM on September 26, 2024. The public notice was also posted on the Department's website.

All residents are given reasonable access to information and records regarding the CAPER. HWS policy is that program records maintained on file requiring research and compilation will be provided within a reasonable time period upon receipt of a written request that specifically states the information desired. Copies of the final CAPER are available upon request and can be made in person or by mail. The CAPER is also available in printable format on the website referenced above.

No comments were received regarding the 2023-24 CAPER during the 15-day comment period. The public was notified that accommodations under the Americans with Disabilities Act are available upon request for all steps and/or actions related to the CAPER and Citizen Participation process.

The CAPER is prepared annually to capture progress toward meeting identified needs and achieving goals. The County has successfully implemented its public improvement and community service projects and programs and met the established objectives. It foresees continued progress through the 2019-2024 Consolidated Plan and One-Year Action Plans.

Key data related to each objective and outcome are summarized in section CR-05. These accomplishment tables are generated to measure outputs and outcomes for CDBG, CDBG-CV, HOME, HOME-ARP, ESG, and ESG-CV. HUD implemented this ongoing performance process to assess efficiency, cost-effectiveness, and the impact of projects and programs in County neighborhoods. Monitoring performance measures help identify and address operational concerns, resource allocation issues, and policy questions in a timelier manner.

The County strongly supports and encourages community-wide participation, input, cooperation, and feedback from all residents of the County in the administration of its CPD-funded programs. The County continues its commitment to meeting priority goals and objectives outlined in the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan and One-Year Action Plans. The County has not made any major changes to the objectives of its CDBG program over the last year. The program continues to focus on public services, public facility improvements, housing rehab, economic development, code enforcement, and other capital infrastructure projects. The only changes that do become necessary are, at times when funding is not moving quickly, alternate projects or programs may be recommended. The County's Citizen Participation Plan allows for such changes through substantial, minor, and technical amendments. Substantial amendments require approval by the County Board of Supervisors through a public notice and public hearing. All amendments require HUD approval.

The following actions were substantial amendments added during the 2023-2024 program year, approved in the 2023-2024 OYAP amendment of the 2019-2024 Five-Year Consolidated Plan:

The participating jurisdiction must inspect each project at project completion and during the period of affordability to determine that the project meets property standards. The on-site inspections must occur within twelve (12) months after project completion and at least once every three (3) years thereafter during the period of affordability.

In accordance with HWS HOME Program Policies and Procedures and HWS (Agency) Monitoring Policy and Procedures, ongoing periodic inspections are conducted of HOME-assisted rental housing to determine compliance with Property Standards 24 CFR 92.251; Qualification as affordable housing: Rental Housing 24 CFR 92.252; Participating jurisdiction responsibilities; written agreements; on-site inspection 24 CFR 92.504.

The HOME-assisted multi-family housing project portfolio consists of forty-eight (48) completed projects. The total number of restricted units ranged from three (3) to 108 HOME-assisted units for all HOME projects; or approximately 1,000 HOME-assisted restricted units available for cursory and full inspections. Construction project inspections are conducted prior to approval of progress payments during construction and until final inspections in compliance with HOME-assisted property standards.

During the COVID-19 pandemic response, HUD issued a waiver period that expired on December 31, 2021. In lieu of onsite inspections, monitoring staff directed efforts to conducting desk compliance reviews. Onsite inspections resumed after the expiration of the HUD waiver period in January 2022.

Compliance monitoring of the County's HOME funded First-Time Home Buyer (FTHB) program involved sending self-certification notices to homeowners. The County randomly selected 5% of FTHB participants and sent them self-certification notices to verify their compliance with program requirements. The relevant HOME requirements are: - HOME requirements at §92.504(a): The participating jurisdiction must have and follow written policies, procedures, and systems, including

a system for assessing the risk of activities and projects and a system for monitoring entities consistent with this section, to ensure that the requirements of this part are met. - HOME requirements regarding On-site inspection at §92.504(d). - HOME requirements regarding Recordkeeping at §92.508. - HOME Program Property Standards at §92.251. The County's HOME funded First-Time Home Buyer (FTHB) program effectively monitors compliance by sending self-certification notices to homeowners. A total of nineteen (19) NSP self-certification notices were sent to homeowners, and seven (7) were received. Additionally, thirty-three (33) HOME self-certification notices were sent to homeowners, and ten (10) were received. An on-site monitoring compliance will be conducted for the unresponsive homeowners.

The desk compliance review continued for all projects in the monitoring portfolio. Most notable was high level of compliance and cooperation. A focus was given to continued marketing in accordance with the updated Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing Plans. Review included:

- Verified rents, unit mix, income levels
- Updated documents such as Insurance Certificates, Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing Plans, Audited Financial Statement and Payments

PROJECTS INSPECTED VIA DESK REVIEW

The HOME-assisted multi-family housing project portfolio consists of forty-eight (48) completed projects. In addition to the onsite physical inspections, the projects are subject to desk review. Desk reviews are conducted for 100% of all projects twice a year via Semiannual Compliance Reports for periods ending 9/30 and 3/31, respectively. Cursory inspections are the same as full inspections, except the latter includes Property Standards review of restricted units. Desk reviews show all the HOME assisted units are compliant with applicable policy and regulation.

On-site inspections are conducted with the goal of continued compliance with applicable policy and regulation. A systematic on-site inspection of HOME projects allows the agency to evaluate the performance of the project over a wide range of functions. Detailed explanations and observations during on-site inspections of HOME projects include review of the following: file management, verification of source documentation, calculation of rent and utilities, rent roll, household leases, property standard inspection, advertising in the local newspaper, specialized advertising to reach minority groups and non-profits [following HUD's Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing (AFHM) Plans]. Evidence for capital improvements, and any deferred maintenance repairs, replacement reserve and operating reserve accounts are reviewed.

Compliance staff conducts the on-site meeting with authorized representatives of the property management company including Community Manager, Regional Manager, Maintenance Staff, and bi-lingual staff members. Files are pulled for a random sample of the restricted units. At a minimum, 20% of the HOME-assisted units are inspected as part of Property Standard inspection. In addition, a sample of sensory impaired and mobility units are inspected.

The County of Riverside will continue maintaining affordable HOME-assisted multi-family units in compliance with HOME regulations. These projects provide high-quality housing to large families, farm worker households, sensory impaired, mentally impaired, mobility impaired, and seniors. The projects are designed to ensure affordability for extremely low, and very low-income households.

Provide an assessment of the jurisdiction's affirmative marketing actions for HOME units. 24 CFR 91.520(e) and 24 CFR 92.351(a)

Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing (AFHM) plans and affirmative marketing procedures are required by the HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program Final Rule (24 CFR Part 92) and are included in applications for Riverside County HOME funds. The County's policy is to distribute information to the public regarding fair housing laws, as well as its own guidelines, for participation in the HOME Program. In accordance with Federal Regulations (24 CFR 92.351), the County adopted an affirmative marketing policy and procedures. The County is committed to equal opportunity in housing choices in the local housing market without discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, national origin, familial status, or disability. Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs), developers and/or owners, of HOME Program funded projects containing five or more units, must comply with the affirmative marketing requirements to receive assistance. Affirmative marketing procedures must continue throughout the period of affordability. The County is committed to affirmative marketing, which is implemented in the HOME Program through a specific set of steps that the County and participating groups follow.

Informing Affected Parties

The County informs the public, potential tenants, and property owners about Federal fair housing laws and the affirmative marketing policy using the following items:

- Equal Housing Opportunity logotype or slogan in press releases, news advisories, solicitations for CHDOs, developers, and/or owners and in all written communications
- Advertising in print and electronic media that is used and viewed or listened to by those identified as least likely to apply; and
- Meetings to inform CHDOs, developers, and/or owners regarding program participants. The County has established procedures to ensure that CHDOs, developers, and/or owners of rental housing developments assisted by the HOME Program solicit applications from persons in the housing market area who are not likely to apply for the housing without special outreach. The CHDOs, developers, and/or owners will solicit applications through such locations as community-based organizations, places of worship, employment centers, fair housing groups, or housing counseling agencies.

Evaluation

The County has established monitoring procedures to assure that each CHDO, developer and/or owner of rental housing adheres to the established requirements and practices in order to carry out the affirmative marketing procedure. The effectiveness of the County's affirmative marketing actions is evaluated annually, and the County will take corrective actions if it finds that property

owners fail to carry out required procedures. The County incorporates the affirmative marketing requirements into the affordable housing agreements and informs developers, owners, and property management about ways to improve current procedures. Those who fail to meet the requirements or to make suggested improvements will be disqualified from future participation in the HOME Program.

Labor Compliance

The County provides "Labor Compliance Provisions" as an attachment to all HOME agreements, construction bids and construction contracts.

On large construction projects, program staff monitors minority business outreach, Davis-Bacon, Section 3 requirements, and project data collection. The Riverside County Board of Supervisors adopted an Affirmative Action Policy Statement to ensure compliance with Section 3. For projects subject to Davis-Bacon Labor Standards, in-house desk reviews and on-site labor compliance interviews are performed to ensure the wage compliance of all contractors. Labor compliance interviews are compared to payroll records submitted by contractors and subcontractors to verify wage compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act. In addition to on-site labor compliance interviews, the Federal Labor Standard Questionnaire form is occasionally sent to employees during the course of the project to ensure the proper payment of wages. All projects are inspected during construction to ensure that all work is in compliance with the originally proposed scope. Any additional work added through the Change Order process during the course of the project is also reviewed and approved to ensure the revised scope of work carried out is eligible for HOME funding.

Section 3

The County requires all contractors with CDBG or HOME-funded construction contracts of \$200,000 or more to comply with Section 3 requirements (24 CFR Part 75) and to visit the Section 3 website for resources, certifications, implementation plan, Section 3 guide, and related forms. To ensure that economic opportunities, most importantly employment, generated by certain HUD financial assistance shall be directed to low- and very low-income persons, particularly those who are recipients of government assistance for housing or residents of the community where the Federal assistance is spent.

In partnership with the Housing Authority of the County of Riverside, WDC programs are marketed to Section 8 recipients whenever annual income certifications are sent out via mail. In addition, the County partners with the Californian Family Life Center (CFLC), a non-profit agency that provides job training and education to youth ages 16-24 in a variety of construction trades. It is the goal of the County to continue these programs that enhance the quality of life and increase job opportunities for its residents.

The County continues its efforts to promote HUD Section 3 contracting and hiring for both the CDBG, HOME, and HOME ARP programs through the online Section 3 website.

In 2023-2024, Riverside County received a total of \$586,266.81 HOME Program Income. This program income has been included in the 2023-2024 Action Plan and allocated toward the County's New Construction (NC).

The County is vigorously obligating and expending funds to increase its efforts to create reasonable housing. In addition, the County remains forward-looking in ensuring projects are in the pipeline for future unit creation.

First-Time Home Buyer (FTHB) Program: The FTHB Program provides HOME funds for down-payment assistance to low- and very low-income households that have not owned homes within a three-year period. The program is available for households with an annual income that is no greater than 80% of the area median income as published by HUD. The FTHB Program provides up to 20% of the purchase price with a 15-year affordability period as a "silent second" loan.

HOME Program - Affordable Multi-Family Housing: The HOME loan program requires a set aside of units affordable to targeted income level households in order to provide affordable housing throughout the area. The program offers gap financing in conjunction with Low Income Housing Tax Credits and Mortgage Revenue Bonds.

Legal instruments are used to protect the affordability of the rental units, and the HOME affordability agreements provide the HUD-required rent limitations. Annual monitoring is performed by County staff to ensure compliance during the affordability period for all HOME projects.

Narrative

The County of Riverside Community & Housing Development includes Section 3 materials in all bid documentation, preconstruction meetings, and technical assistance sessions. Section 3 guidelines are also included in all funding agreements and contracts. The County of Riverside Community & Housing Development includes Workforce Development Board that provides Job Posting & Job Fairs online for contractors and developers as well as the Housing Authority of the County of Riverside (HACR) to promote and advertise Section 3 training opportunities through voluntary self-worker certification for residents of public housing.

In Fiscal year 2023-2024, no Section 3 business concerns were awarded contracts under the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs. Contract activities were reviewed for Section 3 thresholds based on HUD Federal Register the Final Rule, 85 FR 60907, published on September 29, 2020. The County of Riverside applied the established HUD's regulation applicability threshold of \$200,000 for housing rehabilitation, housing construction, and other public construction projects assisted with housing and community development financial assistance. To meet the Section 3 benchmark, the County implemented Qualitative Efforts that consist of Direct, on-the-job training (including apprenticeships) and Outreach efforts to identify and secure bids from Section 3 business concerns.

CR-65- ESG Data Collection

Starting in 2017, ESG recipients are required to use a new tool, SAGE, to report aggregated ESG Program report information. SAGE is configured to aggregate information from an HMIS and produce all statistical information required by HUD on program participants served in ESG-funded projects. This redesign aimed to align the ESG CAPER with the Continuum of Care (CoC) Program's Annual Performance Report (APR). Grant information in SAGE is populated on a regular basis from the grant application information in e-snaps and the financial information from the Line of Credit Control System (LOCCS). The information in SAGE replaces all data previously collected on screen CR-65. Due to victim service providers being prohibited from entering client-level data into a mainstream system, they must instead implement a comparable database with the functionality to generate the CSV CAPER file. There were no victim service providers funded in 2023-24. As the planning body, the CoC coordinates the community's policies, strategies, and activities toward ending homelessness and must also establish and consistently follow written standards for providing CoC assistance. In order to collect client-level data on the provision of housing and services to the homeless or those at risk of homelessness, a CoC must have an established Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). This system allows for standardized data collection from projects serving homeless families and individuals. Refer to the attachment for the ESG-CAPER Annual Reporting Tool (SAGE) for statistical information on program participants served. Through the data gathered, the CoC can measure performance at the system and project levels, including outcomes of projects funded under the ESG program. Data is also used to analyze needs, establish funding priorities, and measure the overall effectiveness of the homeless programs. The County of Riverside CoC implemented a Coordinated Entry System (CES) through the 25 Cities Project, a partnership with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), to eliminate homelessness among veterans by 2016 and chronic homelessness by 2020. The County was the first to reach functional zero for ending veterans' homelessness. The pilot in the Greater City of Riverside Area has been expanded countywide. A Coordinated Entry System Advisory Team was formed and continues to meet to develop written standards, policies, and guidelines for CES. The goal of a CES is to cover a large geographic area for individuals and families seeking housing or services. The systems serve as a database to prioritize based on the highest level of need and include a comprehensive and standardized assessment tool. Participating agencies are responsible for engaging chronically homeless individuals and families using Housing Navigators and a standardized vulnerability assessment and intake process that provides referrals to a centralized housing system that places priority on those who are at the highest risk with the most appropriate intervention rather than a "first come, first served" approach. Each assessment point of the coordinated system handles an initial, comprehensive assessment or screening of

client needs, data entry, referrals, and, potentially, program admissions. Ideally, these centers also serve as the main access points for prevention and diversion services. After an initial assessment, assessment center staff provides the necessary prevention or diversion services or admits or refers a family or individual to the program best equipped to get them into permanent housing as quickly as possible.

9. Project Outcomes Data measured under the performance standards developed in consultation with the CoC(s)

Based on standards and goals of the local CoC and the County's written performance standards for providing ESG assistance, the County and sub-recipients must ensure that data on all persons served, and all activities assisted under ESG are entered into a community wide HMIS: HMIS is a mandatory comprehensive and standardized data collection tool used to track and consolidate data from projects serving homeless families and individuals. This performance data allows better coordination with other service providers and provides integration with other programs targeted to homeless people in the area covered by the CoC. Collecting quality data is a prerequisite for measuring outcomes and performance at the system and project level. Performance targets are established by program type for each County of Riverside CoC program. The performance targets currently used by the CoC are those established by HUD's CoC performance standards. The County of Riverside CoC established a Standards and Evaluation Committee that reviews these standards on a regular basis and requests feedback and guidance from the CoC membership. The CoC membership consists of non-profit organizations, community and faith-based establishments, formerly homeless individuals, private industry, and federal, state, and local governments. The CoC Board of Governance will approve the performance measures report annually on behalf of the CoC membership, as required by HUD. ESG performance standards are followed per 24 CFR Part 576, including measures to evaluate the effectiveness of the program and measures to assess how well the program serves the targeted population. In consultation with the CoC, the County will continue to implement performance standards for measuring project outcomes and the overall effectiveness of providing services to those who are in the most need of assistance, reducing the number of people living on the streets or in emergency shelters, reducing the time people spend homeless, reducing program participants' housing barriers or housing stability risks, reducing additional episodes of homelessness, reducing first-time homelessness, and facilitating job and income growth for persons who are homeless.

Of the 2,993 persons served, the length of stay for 0-7 days was 799 clients with 753 that left and 46 that stayed equally to a 94% rate of leavers. For emergency shelters, performance measurements included the number of clients exiting to permanent housing, increased income overall for adults at an exit or by the end of the operating year, and program bed utilization. Further, 1,821 had no income at the start, and 1,513 had income at the exit for a 72% increase in clients leaving with income. In addition, 1,831 clients received Medicaid, and 146 clients received Medicare Health Insurance. The gender of the 2,993 clients served was made up of 1,713 male, 1,252 female, 8 transgender, 2 non-binary, 2 different identity, 12-woman transgender, 3-male transgender and 1 data not collected. The age range of the 2,993 served under 5 was 75. The age range of 5-12 years was 120; 13-17 was 274;18-24 was 231; 25-34 was 656; 35-44 was 665; 45-54 was 437; 55-64 was 409; and 65 was 126. There has been a slight decrease compared to the previous year. For outreach services, performance measurements included the number of clients exiting to housing, increased income overall for adults at exit or by the end of the operating year, and linkages to conditionspecific services. For rapid re-housing, performance measurements included the number of clients exiting to permanent housing, increased income overall for adults at exit or by the end of the operating year, rapid housing placement, and permanent housing retention.

Eligible recipients included nonprofits and public agencies. Services were provided throughout the County and cooperating cities. The County's ESG grant funds were matched far more than the required 100% match amount detailed in Section CR-75.

In FY 2023-2024, ESG funds were expended for the following non-administrative activities: \$245,000 in assistance to emergency/transitional shelters which benefited 1,572 homeless persons; \$74,510 in outreach assistance which benefited 255 homeless persons; \$202,772 assisted 31 eligible persons with rapid re-housing assistance and \$50,000 assisted 12 eligible persons with homelessness prevention.

As a requirement of the ESG Federal Regulations 24 CFR 576, a recipient must make matching contributions to supplement the recipient's ESG program in an amount that equals the amount of ESG funds provided by HUD. Matching contributions, referred to as "leveraging", may be obtained from any eligible source, including any Federal source other than the ESG program, as well as state, local, and private sources. Additional requirements apply to matching contributions from a federal source of funds. Matching contributions for 2023-24 were \$4,290,583.05. Applicants are encouraged to utilize the greatest amount of leveraging possible to improve the competitiveness of their proposal.

1.On January 25, 2023, Riverside County's Continuum of Care (CoC) conducted its annual Homeless Point-in-Time Count (HPITC). The numbers below highlight findings which help identify gaps in the service delivery system and the nature and extent of homelessness countywide. The 2023 HPITC shows an overall increase of homeless population in Riverside County persons from 3,316 in 2022to 3,725. Of the total number of 3,725 persons experiencing homelessness counted, 2,441 were unsheltered and 1,284 were sheltered. The unsheltered count also demonstrated changes in sub-populations of interest. Households with children experienced a 22% increase, TAY showed a 35% decrease, seniors aged 62 years or above demonstrated a 47% increase, and the number of unsheltered veterans increased by 36% compared to the 2022 HPITC.

For this reason, 60% of ESG funding was allocated to emergency shelters to assist in providing shelter to these homeless populations.

2. ESG funds were allocated to Rapid Rehousing and Homelessness Prevention for the purpose of achieving sustainability and the outcome of over 35% of those assisted would remain housed at least 6 months after being housed was accomplished. Agencies continue to monitor and provide support and resources to clients for 6-9 months after exiting from the program assistance.

3. A reduction in the reoccurrence of homelessness for individuals and families who exit the shelter system occurred and represented in the HMIS reporting.

2. Briefly describe what you did not meet and why. If they are not measurable as written type in N/A as the answer.

Based on the reporting in HMIS, the action plan was met by providing permanent housing and assisting those at-risk of losing housing was accomplished. Further, shelter beds were provided to targeted group of youth, families, seniors, and individuals. In addition, attention was provided to veterans to assist in navigating to services to quickly stabilize and house.

Although the standards were measurable, an increase to the percentage of 35% should be reviewed to increase this expectation. 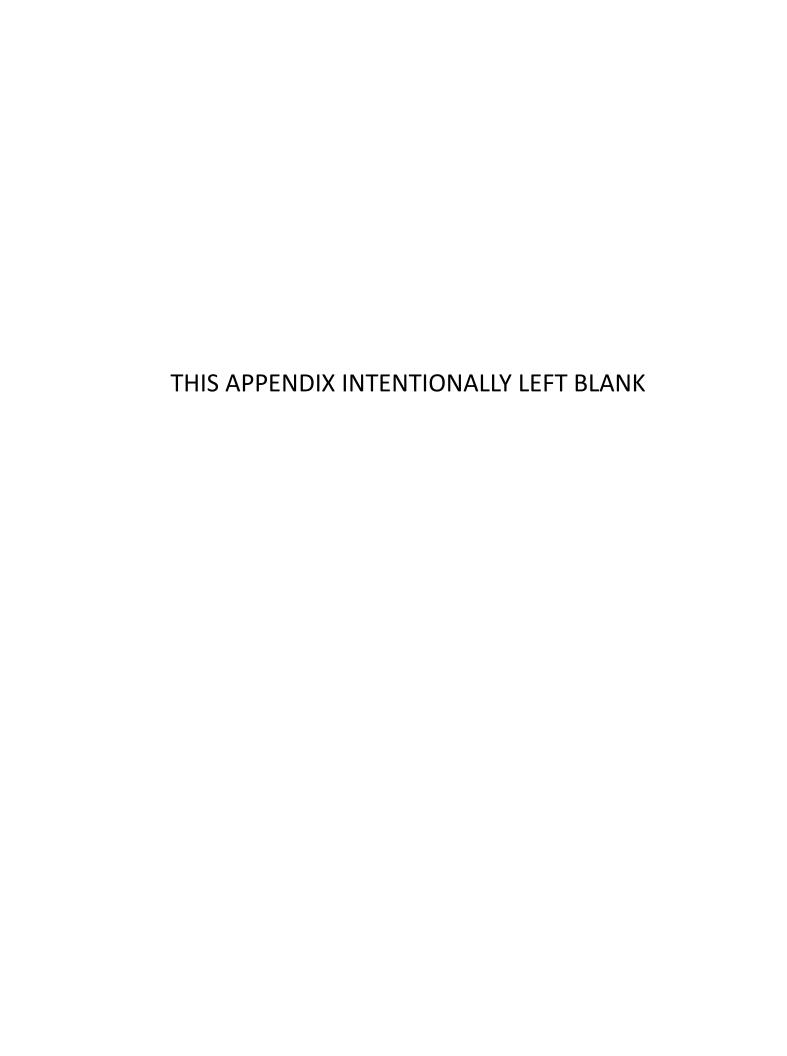

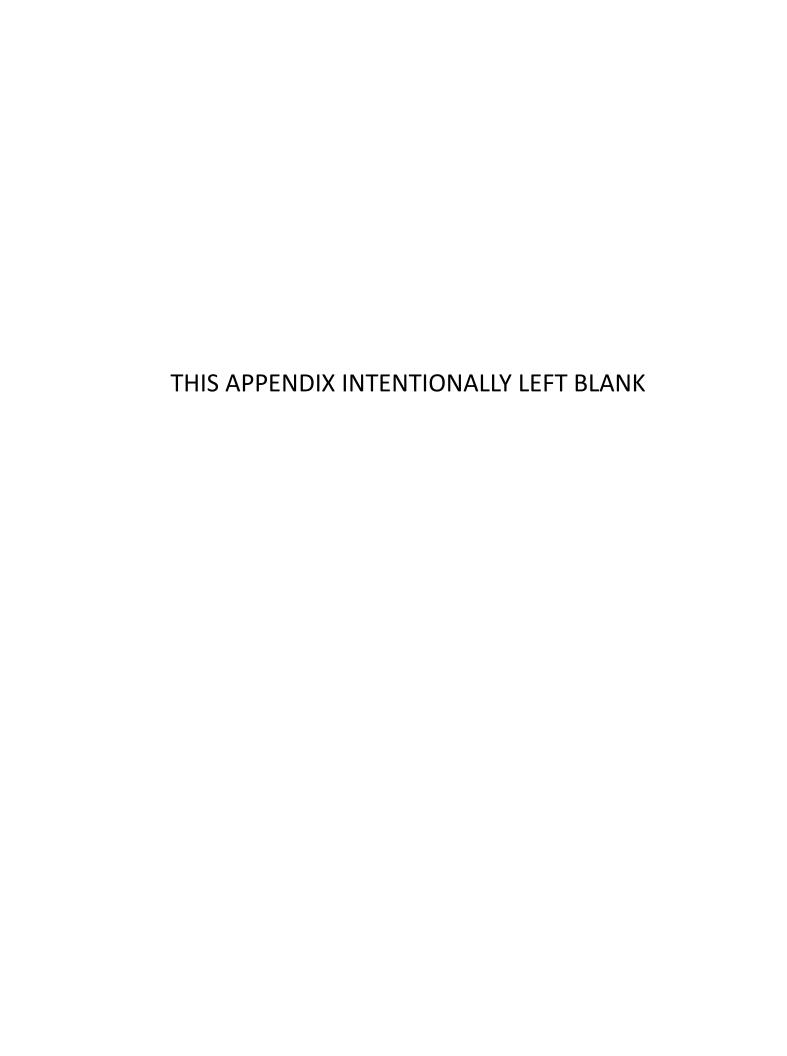
