



- ✓ Inception of 5-city collaboration: The Regional Homeless Alliance (RHA)
 - Cities of Murrieta, Temecula, Lake Elsinore, Menifee and Wildomar
 - ✓ Police department collaboration
- ✓ Nonprofit partners: SWAG, Project Touch, others
- Grants awarded
 - WRCOG BEYOND Grant
 - ✓ Kaiser Community Foundation
- ✓ Temecula HELP Center





Regional Homeless Alliance APPROACH & PROCESS

- ✓ <u>Collaboration</u>: Working with a variety of partners, nonprofit stakeholders, and regional collaboration
 - ✓ <u>Coordination</u>: Between cities, police departments, private property owners, park rangers, and code enforcement



✓ <u>Communication</u>: Community education of both residents and businesses to address concerns of homelessness

MURRIETA AND TEMECULA POLICE DEPARTMENTS



COMMUNITY POLICING TEAM (CPT)

- Police teams with specific homeless training that seeks innovative and comprehensive solutions to quality of life issues
- Other responsibilities:
 - AB 109/Prop 47/Prop 57, probation, parole
- Measure T (Murrieta) and Measure S (Temecula) funded
- Collaborate with 5 RHA cities/Sheriff


COMMUNITY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH ASSESSMENT TEAM (CBAT)

- Collaboration with Riverside University System Behavioral Health Department
- Specially trained MPD/TPD (Sheriff) Officer teamed with clinical therapist for calls involving suspected mental illness
- CBAT seeks to avoid adverse outcomes by diverting individuals with mental health issues to appropriate community services
- Measure T/Measure S funded
- Collaboration/share between two cities




POINT IN TIME COUNT

- 2019 County: 2,045 unsheltered (21% increase from 2018)
- 2019 City: 439 unsheltered (20% increase from 2018)
- 2020 County: 2,155 unsheltered
- 2020 City 587 unsheltered





COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH TO HOMELESSNESS





OFFICE OF HOMELESS SOLUTIONS

Services Provided:

- Obtaining California Identification cards and Social Security cards
- Applying for health benefits
- Employment assistance through Goodwill / Workforce Development
- Referrals to medical and mental health clinics

- Life skills workshops
- Applying for main stream benefits (Social Security, CalFresh)
- Transportation services
- Trip Home
- Rental assistance programs
- Case management

The Riverside Village Shelter

What: A homeless shelter with wraparound supportive services

Where: 2880 Hulen Place, Riverside, CA 92507

Beds: 56

Operator: City Net with funding from the City of Riverside

Why: Provide shelter to residents of the City of Riverside who are experiencing homelessness

Location: Adjacent to the Access Center and other non profit organizations.

Design: Pallet homes with men's, women's, couples' living spaces, including 4 ADA compliant pallet homes; a modular building dining area; showers; restrooms; pet area; bike racks and a resource center for program participants.

Employees: 10-12 including shelter manager, program supervisors, case managers, housing navigators, shelter and logistics coordinators.











The Riverside City Council authorized 20 of the shelters Jan. 21, and the company that makes them - Pallet Shelters in Washington - loaned 10 more at Bailey's request. Donations from nonprofit groups mean the additional shelters can also stay, Bailey said.

On August 4, 2020, the City Council approved the revised Expenditure Plan for the Coronavirus Aid, Relieve, and Economic Security Act funding from the State of California totaling \$27,991,888.

The plan includes \$2,000,000 in funding to implement the Massachusetts Action Plan that staff plans to commence on September 1, 2020 and end by December 30, 2020

6 Step Plan

- 1. Data Driven
- 2. Outreach Services
- 3. Shelter Services
- 4. Permanent Housing Placements
- 5. Safety
- 6. Beautification & Renovation



ADDITIONAL SHELTER BEDS

SHELTER/RESPITE BEDS

Approved allocation: \$2,600,000

Funds expended: \$1,386,810.59

- Highlights:
 - -Partnership with the Illumination Foundation
 - -Will provide shelter/recuperative care beds to 50 individuals experiencing homelessness that have been released from local hospitals; allows for the hospital beds to be freed up for COVID-19 efforts.
 - -Funding supports acquisition of property and conversion of space (tenant improvements) to facilitate establishment of shelter.





OHS/Housing Authority

- 15 Housing Projects
 - 534 total units (100% affordable)
 - 229 units will be restricted/permanent supportive housing
- Investment
 - Direct financial assistance to 8 of 15 projects
 - Approximately \$13.4M
- Aggressive pursuit of state grant funding (i.e., affordable housing tax credits, NPLH, AHSC, TCC, SMHP, MHP)




RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

- Approved allocation: \$3,615,521.00
- Funds expended: \$791,166.54
- Highlights:
 - -Partnership with the Fair Housing Council
 - -Interest has not been to the extent expected; unspent funds will be reallocated.
 - –As of November 6: 132 tenants have qualified for assistance, and 124 applications are pending review. An additional 52 applications are pending the submittal of additional documents.
 - -2,316 application packets/flyers have been distributed and 211 calls have been received.









Mission Heritage (3901/3933 Mission Inn Avenue & 3942 6th Street)

- Partnership: Fair Housing Council and Wakeland Development
- 72 units of affordable housing; 22 units set-aside for veterans
- City Participation: \$3 million
- Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program:

\$16.8 million







Cedar Glen II (9830 County Farm Road)

- Developer: Palm Communities
- 50 units of affordable housing
- City Participation: \$650,000
- No Place Like Home: \$3.3 million



St. Michaels Project (4070 Jackson Street)

- Partnership: St. Michael's Episcopal Church, Community Development Partners, and Mercy House
- 50 units for extremely low-income residents
- City Participation: \$2 million
- No Place Like Home: \$4.3 million







Oasis Senior Villas (2340 14th Street)

- Developer: A Community of Friends
- 95 units of low-income senior housing
- Requesting \$2 million from City
- No Place Like Home: \$8.2 million



HOMELESS HOUSING ASSISTANCE AND PREVENTION PROGRAM

- \$650 million one-time block grant to address homelessness challenges, to be distributed among:
 - Continuums of Care \$190 million
 - Counties \$175 million
 - 13 largest cities in California \$275 million
- City will receive \$6.9 million in funding
 - Mayor Bailey led the advocacy effort to expand Big City Mayors to include Riverside
