

In February of 2020, Riverside County announced plans to consolidate the county's homeless services into one distinct Housing and Workforce Solutions (HWS) department. The consolidation appointed the Housing and Workforce Solutions Department as the Continuum of Care (CoC) Lead Agency and positioned our county to provide seamless services and resources to individuals and families struggling with homelessness.

COACHELLA VALLEY ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS (CVAG) SUCCESS STORY



ANNE JOHNSTONE

For over 10 years Anne Johnstone experienced homelessness while living in Palm Springs, after involvement with the criminal justice system. The Coachella Valley Association of Governments (CVAG) was able to enroll Anne into the CV200 program – a by-name list of chronically homeless individuals who have historically been shelter resistant. When Anne entered the program, she was exhausted, hot, and tired of sleeping in the local parks. After working with CVAG for only three months, Anne was successfully housed in her own one-bedroom senior living apartment in Desert Hot Springs on July 23, 2021.





Clients Served by Age and Gender



Clients Served by Race and Ethnicity



Individuals Served by Gender




Individuals Served by Race



Individuals with Mental Health by Age Group




Individuals with Substance Abuse by Age Group



HMIS LEAD AGENCY

The purpose of HMIS is to record and store client-level information about the numbers, characteristics and needs of persons who use homeless housing and supportive services and about persons who receive assistance for persons at risk of homelessness over time. This collection of information allows production of an unduplicated count of homeless persons for each Continuum of Care, to understand the extent and nature of homelessness locally, regionally and nationally, and to understand services use and measure the effectiveness of programs

The Riverside County Continuum of Care (CoC) supports the Housing Authority of the County of Riverside (HACR) to administer the Emergency Housing Voucher (EHV) program that was launched on September 7, 2021.

What are Emergency Housing Vouchers (EHVs)?

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) provided \$5 billion dollars for rental assistance in the form of Emergency Housing Vouchers (EHVs) that are administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) through local public housing agencies (PHAs) like HACR.

How are these vouchers administered?

HUD is requiring PHAs to work with their Continuums of Care (CoCs) as well as homeless services and victim service provider organizations as referral partners. PHAs must accept referrals from the CoCs' Coordinated Entry System (CES).

Who is eligible to receive the vouchers?

To be eligible for the EHVs, individuals and families must be:

- Homeless;
- At risk of homelessness;
- Recently homeless and providing the voucher would prevent the individual's or family's homelessness or having a high risk of housing instability; or
- Fleeing or attempting to flee human trafficking, domestic violence, sexual assault, or dating violence.

The Housing Authority of the County of Riverside has been awarded **347** EHVs.

The County of Riverside intends to use these EHVs to:

- Launch Moving-On Initiative to turnover permanent supportive housing units: **89 vouchers**
- Support transitions for Rapid Rehousing recipients from FY 20/21 & 21/22: **648 vouchers**
- Help eligible individuals and families affected by domestic violence, human trafficking & sexual assault: **50 vouchers**

- 2 Homeless Service Provider sends Housing Authority Certification Form to HomeConnect / Coordinated Entry System (CES) at homeconnect@ruhealth.org

- 1 Applicant registers on Housing Choice Voucher (Section 8) Waitlist at www.harivco.org
- 2 Partnering DV Providers such as Alternatives to Domestic Violence, Shelter From The Storm, and Riverside Area Rape Crisis Center sends Certification Form to HomeConnect / CES
- 3 HomeConnect / CES validates eligibility and refers applicant to Housing Authority of the County of Riverside (HACR). HACR processes application and contacts applicant and/or Homeless Service Provider as needed
- 4 HACR provides EHV Application to Homeless Service Provider and/or applicant for completion
- 5 HACR invites Homeless Service Provider and/or applicant to voucher issuance debriefing and orientation
- 6 Applicant and/or Homeless Service Provider works with HACR to help applicant with housing search, negotiation, inspection, lease agreement, and move-in

Operation Safehouse

Speakers: AJ Vasquez, Field Manager & Beatriz Meza

The 2020 Youth Point-in-Time Count identified 326 youth experiencing homelessness in Riverside County (41% increase from 2019). Operation SafeHouse is assisting homeless youth and at risk youth by providing emergency shelter, intervention, and outreach services. This presentation will provide an overview of the main programs Operation SafeHouse offers for homeless youth, runaway youth, and youth in crisis between the ages of 11 and 24.

Speaker: Beth Bartholomew, Director I, Pupil & Administrative Services

The McKinney Vento Act defines an unaccompanied youth as a "homeless child or youth not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian." To meet this requirement, the youth's living arrangement must also meet the definition of homeless. Often youth that have runaway give up on school not realizing they can enroll themselves in school and maintain stability, receive homeless services, and have access to additional resources and supports available through the McKinney Vento Homeless Program.

Please join us for collaborative discussions on priorities, outreach and engagement strategies, location mapping, mobile survey development, and identification of deployment sites in each city/region.


